

Keeping Them On The Farm

(A copy of the National Catholic Rural Life Conference Testimony from Mrs. Mary Martin.)

We have two children—a boy, 22, and a girl, 18. Through our work and cooperation together we have managed to save our home. We are proud of it. We have worked hard to improve it. We have a modern house and dairy barn, and much of the work we have done ourselves.

In the spring of 1938, our son graduated from high school at the age of sixteen years. At that time I purchased for him a Purbred Guernsey heifer, which he entered in the 4-H Guernsey Club. He was successful as a club member. The first year, his heifer took second premium in the 4-H exhibition. During the second year of his 4-H membership, his heifer took first premium, and received Grand Champion over all classes. In this way he received his start of Purbred Guernseys. From then on he was deeply interested in Guernsey cattle.

MAS MONTHLY INCOME

As we went on with our dairy farming program, I always helped him to realize a small income. His cattle increased as time went by. Now he owns eleven head of Purbred Guernseys. Four of them are milking; two more will freshen soon. While his income was still small, I supplemented it with wages. Two years ago he purchased five young sows which farrowed about forty pigs. By fattening and marketing these pigs he realized some return. At the present time, his monthly income amounts to nearly \$100.

I furnish most of the equipment and we farm cooperatively. A year ago my son purchased a tractor for \$200 cash. We need it to pick our corn, and then I permitted him to use my tractor with his partner to do some work for our neighbors. This brought him an additional income.

The girl graduated from high school last June (1942). We studied hard to make plans to keep her interested and occupied on the farm. Her mother gave her a partnership in the poultry flock. They raised 500 chicks; from these they selected their laying flock. Instead of a purchased calf as I had given my son, I gave her a purchased heifer near farrowing time. Now she gets income from her cow in addition to her poultry income. She realizes \$10 or more weekly. Several weeks ago she told her mother that she was doing as well as the girls in town.

FAMILY UNITED

As parents on the farm we are grateful that we can have constant watch over our children; that we can share with them our income and common responsibilities; that we can give them a rural and Christian life.

You may think you cannot do what we have done; you may think that we inherited money. We started with \$200 and a Ford car 22 years ago. It was a slow beginning. I worked in town 16 months until we had saved \$600. Then we rented a farm and started farming. We made our money room as far as possible and would go a little to purchase a cow, 2 dozen chickens, 2 hens, 4 pigs to raise for housed sows, and a few necessary implements. LATER the farm we were renting was offered for sale; we purchased it with a small down payment and the balance on a term contract. Today we are farming about 300 acres, and care for 80 head of Purbred Guernsey cattle, besides our hogs and poultry.

However, most of these fallen workings do not worry about this aspect; all they are concerned about is their vulgar, immature satisfaction with their earthly lusts, which, as a rule, are not initiated for very long.

But, when poor, innocent, defenseless children are dragged down by the ugly sin of their father or mother, that is bad. In fact, about the saddest and most shameful thing that can happen in this life. How any parents can become so degraded as one of life's many miseries. How they dare to move about in society, with broad hips, would be another insatiable question, except for the lamentable reason that neophytes, friends and relatives seem to condone their disorderly act, and also, their own adultery.
