AUBURN.—St. Mary's Basketball team won its eleventh straight victory on Tuesday evening when the team defeated the Holy Family team by a score of 41 to 26, and took the pennant of the league. Winning the game and the pennant marked the first time in the visitors' rule for St. Mary's. In the second game of the evening St. Hyacinth's defeated the Columbian Squires by a score of 38 to 23. The victory was the ninth of the season and the fifth straight win for St. Hyacinth's. Steve Tukar of St. Hyacinth's, the league's leading scorer, accounted for 13 credits on Tuesday evening to bring his season's total to 113 points in 13 games. The last game was the St. Peter-Paul vs. St. Aloysius in which the former defeated the latter by a score of 48-27.


