St. Mary's Five Wins

AUBURN.—St. Mary's basketball team won its eleventh straight victory on Tuesday evening when the team defeated the Holy Family team by a score of 43 to 24 and took the possession of the league. Winning the game and the pennant marked the first time in the victors' role for St. Mary's team. In the second game of the evening St. Hyacinth's defeated the Columbian Squires by a score of 34 to 23. The victory was the ninth of the season and the fifth straight win for St. Hyacinth's. Steve Tarkenton of St. Hyacinth's, the league's leading scorer, accounted for 13 credits on Tuesday evening by bringing his season's total to 113 points in 11 games. The last game was the St. Peter and Paul vs. St. Aloysius in which the former defeated the latter by a score of 40-27.

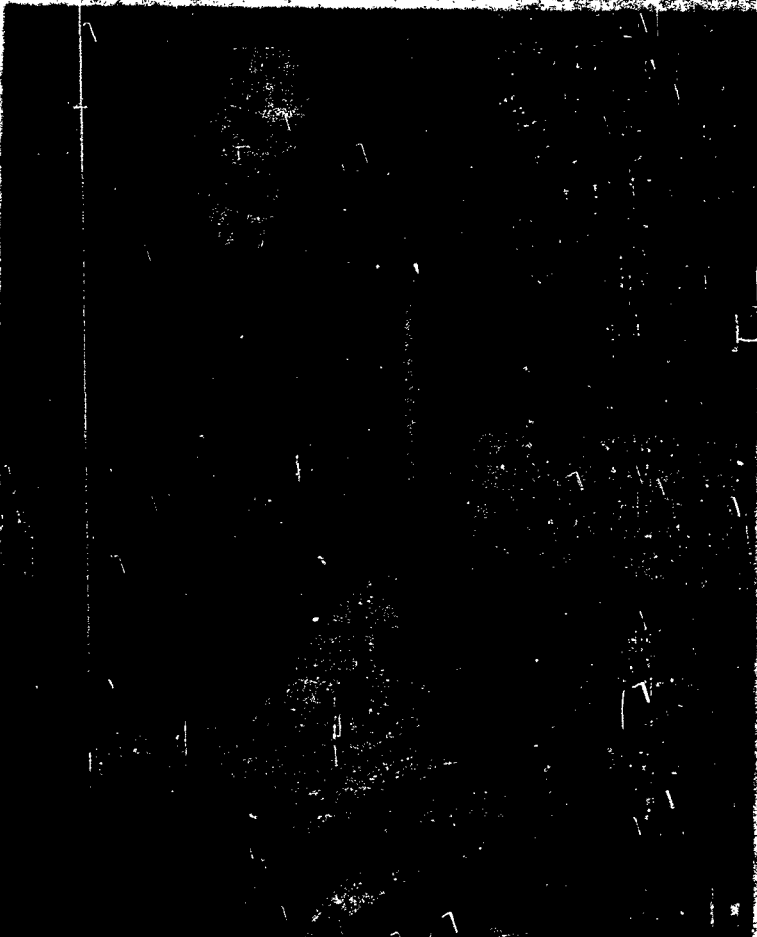
