WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems has arranged two spring meetings, one in Wheeling, W. Va., and the other in Erie, Pa.

The Wheeling meeting has been scheduled for May 23 and 24, and the Erie meeting for May 25 and 26. Bishop of Wheeling has designated the Rev. Edmund J. Yahn, pastor of St. Joseph's Cathedral, Wheeling, as chairman of the conference. The Erie meeting will be held in

May 25. After to be announced later, under the auspices of the Most Rev. John Mark Gannon, Bishop of Erie.

Students Strike When Rector In Mexico Is Ousted By Politicians

MEXICO CITY (UC)—Ousting by Michoacan politicians of Dr. Victoriano Anguiano from his position as Rector of the University of San Nicolas de Hidalgo at Morelia, presumably because he advocated amendment of Article 3 of the Federal Constitution at the recent National Education Congress, has had further repercussions in the Capital. The student body of the National Autonomous University here is on strike and refuses to return to classes until full autonomy is restored to the Morelia institution.

President Manuel Avila Camacho has withdrawn Federal aid from San Nicolas.

The direct action of the President, which confirms his announced policy that the social and cultural forces of the country are not to be subjected to political capriciousness and the arbitrariness of government officials, has met with popular acclaim and is regarded as a masterpiece politically.

It has always been a matter of great satisfaction to the majority of Mexicans that the universities, because of their constitutionally guaranteed autonomy, have been able to keep higher education in Mexico free from the influence of "Socialist" or other political trends.

Popular sympathy naturally would be on the side of the Rector of the Autonomous University of San Nicolas which happens to be one of the oldest in America, having been founded by the first Bishop of Michoacan, who had proposed amendment of the obnoxious education clause in the Federal Constitution.

Rebuke to Governor. The President's decision to withhold Federal funds from the University but to make them available for Michoacan students who wish to continue their studies at other universities, constitutes a rebuke to Governor Felix Ireta without violating the sovereignty of the State of Michoacan.

"Those in office ought to set an example of honesty and respect for institutions and human liberty," President Avila Camacho said to Dr. Victoriano. "When the social forces are affected by some error or act of bad faith emanating from public functionaries, these forces are exercising their rights in demanding reparation for the offense; officials who do not comply with their duties should find their own punishment in moral reprobation of their acts by all citizens."

Student Strike Continues. The student body of the National Autonomous University is on strike and refuses to return to classes until autonomy is restored to the University of San Nicolas de Hidalgo at Morelia. Students here in the Capital are solidly behind the rector, council, faculty and students of the Michoacan State University in their opposition to political meddling by Governor Ireta and the Michoacan Legislature.

Nun on Committee

695,200 HOLY COMMUNIONS RECEIVED BY SERVICEMEN IN MONTH OF DECEMBER

NEW YORK—Reports from 1-124 commissioned and 138 auxiliary chaplains on duty with the armed forces reveal that a total of 695,200 Holy Communion were received by American fighting men all over the world during December, it was announced at the Military Ordinatee today.

The figure represents a new monthly high, officials stated. It does not include Holy Communion received by Catholic military personnel at civilian churches.

In disclosing the figure, the Most Rev. John F. O'Hara, C.S.C., Military Delegate, said that the highest previous number of Holy Communion reported was for the month of November, 1942, when reports from 1,003 commissioned and 127 auxiliary chaplains showed a total of 588,013 Sacred Hosts distributed to military personnel.

The figures for Holy Communion received on Christmas and the Feast of the Immaculate Conception totaled 262,495. The December First Friday total was 14,604. The Sunday total was 234,108 and the week-day total 135,022. Communion distributed to military and naval hospital patients totaled 9,158 during the month.

Third Bravery Award

St. Petersburg, Fla.—Lieut. (J.G.) Regis J. Schaefer, U.S.N.R., a member of St. Paul's Church parish here, has been decorated with the silver star medal for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity" as commander of an armed guard crew aboard a merchant ship during aerial dive-bombing and the sinking of the vessel on June 13, 1942.
