

Nazareth Girl Honored By Red Cross At Meeting

Alyce Madden, a Nazareth Academy Senior, was chosen to represent the entire Junior Red Cross at the recent Red Cross Report dinner held in the Chamber of Commerce building, Thursday, Mar. 14.

In addition, Miss Madden was one of the speakers of the evening, giving for the subject of her talk, "What the Red Cross Means to Me."

Original Address
In an original manner, she brought out the symbolism of the Red Cross banner, the courage inspired by its red, "the kind of courage that means strength and bravery enough to follow the boys into the battles, ministering to them, and aiding them. The courage that brings a smile to make a smile when the heart is sore and the body weary."

"Red," she went on to say, "is in flushed faces bending over hot stoves, where huge kettles bubble in anticipation of eager welcomes. It is in the nipped noses of canvasbacks, it is in hands roughened by continuous knitting and sewing. The courage — Red of the Red Cross flag flames in proof that there is still charity in man."

She spoke of the Cross as a symbol of "Mercy and compassion and sacrifice. Under its arms stretched to the four corners of the world, tireless efforts are waged to bring relief to suffering and security to instability."

In conclusion: "The greatest mother in the world looks at us from the quiet of a painting, to me, the Red Cross is that painting come to life."

Open New WAAC Centre For Enlistment Guidance

A New WAAC Headquarters has opened in Rochester, at 82 East Avenue, where information regarding WAAC enrollment may be easily obtained. This new campaign to increase WAAC registrations is under the supervision of the WAAC's Civilian Committee, with George Dorobus, Secretary of the Rochester Automobile Club as Chairman.

This new office is open from 11 a. m. to 7 p. m. and from 9 p. m. to 6 p. m. This makes it easy for interested women to drop in and ask questions, learn about the fine opportunity to help win the war by releasing a man from certain classifications of work which women can just as well do.

The standards are high in the WAAC organization. It is a group which any father and mother would be proud to have their daughter join. No, it isn't too easy to get into. A girl must have an abundance of the three essentials: Mental, spiritual and physical qualifications.

This WAAC work is a challenge to all women between the ages of 21 to 44 who believe they can pass the qualifying tests. Upon doing so, a WAAC takes over the duties of a male soldier in many important fields and release them for service on our fighting fronts. It is going to take more and more men for our armies, that is positive. Therefore, we must have more and more WAACs to fill in the gaps.

WAAC pay is good, from \$56 a month to \$138 per month in the ranks, and from \$150 to \$333.33 per month for officers.

All officers are now going to be recruited from the ranks. This
