Jewish Soldier Carries Miraculous Medal: Credits Survival To Bl. Virgin

SAN DIEGO.—The story of a Jewish soldier, full-gunner on a bomber in the South Pacific, who carries a Miraculous Medal and attributes his survival of many perilous engagements to the care of the Blessed Virgin is told in a letter sent by Capt. Kenneth G. Stack, army chaplain and a priest of this diocese, in a letter to the Most Rev. Charles F. Buddy, Bishop of San Diego.

Writing of the return of a bomber from a still engagement with the enemy, Father Stack said:

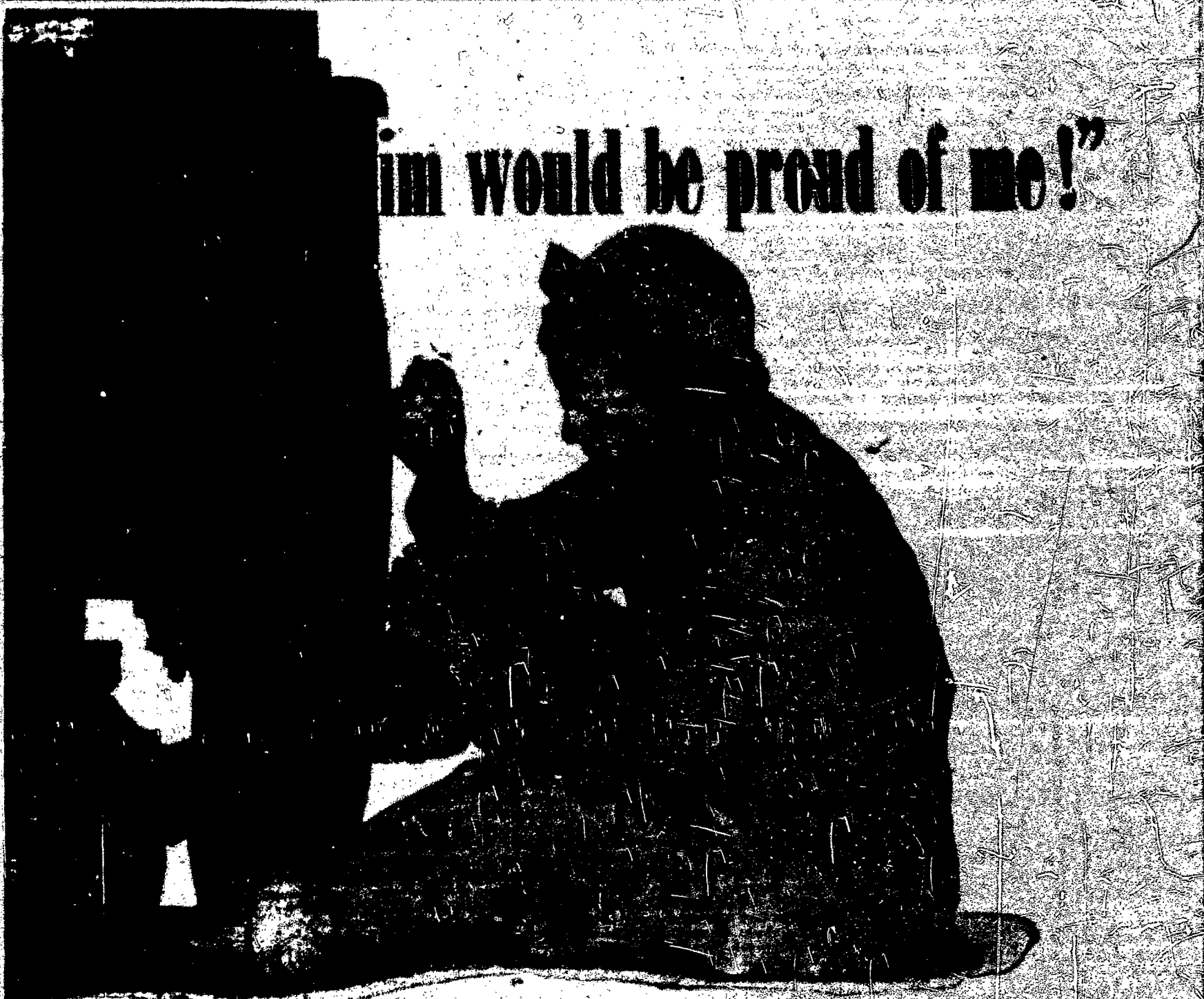
"Not long ago, when we were returning from a mission in which the plane had been heavily attacked by zeroes and anti-aircraft fire, one of the pilots—gunners seldom see the enemy. As I sat on the tail-gunner came out of his turret, reached into his pocket and produced a beautiful Miraculous Medal which he also asked me to bless."

"He must have read the question in my eyes because he immediately spoke up: 'The Jewish, Father-

but I always carry the Blessed Mother with me—she's my strength.' "How was he lucky to give her credit for our escape from a perilous number of enemy aircraft. He related my experience throughout when he said: 'I know it's her that gets us out of these tight spots.' "With such a blessing as that, who can deny her the title—'Mother of Miracles.'"
