\$25,000,000 War Bond Drive Wins Backing Of K. of C. In Diocese

Bishop Kearney Spurs State-Wide Campaign For \$3,000,000 Goal

Launching of the \$25,000,000 War Bond Campaign of the Knights of Columbus throughout the entire upper State Councils in the Diocese of Rochester ready to do their share and eager to attain their quotas.

Impetus to the campaign within the diocesan limits and throughout the state is being given by His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, State Chaplain, of the order.

The Campaign is being conducted as a feature of Founders Month by the K. of C. and its success will honor the late Rev. Michael J. McElvenny of New Haven, Conn., and other founders of the order 61 years ago. This was sponsored by Supreme Secretary Joseph F. Lamb of New Haven, chairman of the order-wide drive.

Buy Millions

To spur the campaign, the Executive and Finance Committee of the Supreme Board of Directors, at a meeting in New York, Mar. 13, voted to purchase \$1,000,000 worth of United States Treasury Bonds to be issued in April in connection with the Government's \$10,000,000,000 financing program for that month.

Reports will be made by the individual councils to the Supreme Council on cards especially provided. These reports will cover (1) the War Bonds procured by members through payroll deductions during the month of April, (2) any other bonds which they may purchase, and (3) the sales of any bonds for which they may have been directly responsible or instrumental.

Each Grand Knight was called upon to appoint a committee to arrange for the sale of bonds and to promote the sale through publicity and meetings.

Goal in New York State is \$3,000,000 and State Deputy Hugh A. Doyle states that advance reports indicate that New York State pass that goal.

Cooperation of local and state War Savings Staff administrators is being given wholeheartedly to the campaign.

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VATICAN FILM SHOWS POPE IN ACTION

'Story Of Vatican' Film Opens In Auburn, April 6; Sponsored By C. D. of A.

AUBURN—The Story of the Vatican, the first full length feature ever filmed inside Vatican City will open at the Capitol Theater on Tuesday, April 6, and will run for three days.

Produced with the cooperation and approval of the authorities of the Holy See, the film brings to the world a true picture of the tiny Papal State. The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen, "the Monsignor of the Microphone," America's outstanding author, lecturer and teacher, is the narrator.

The film depicts all phases of civil and ecclesiastical life within the Vatican and the narrator gives a wealth of knowledge, both historical and descriptive of objects and places shown in the movie. Four months were required to make the film, the central figure of which is the Holy Father and the central edifice, St. Peter's Basilica.

Within the short space of fifty-three minutes the film brings to the screen many scenes which a visitor at the Vatican would never be able to see. The pictures are silent except for the voice of the narrator with one exception when the voice of Pope Pius XII is heard.

INSIDE VATICAN CITY

The architecture of the Vatican is shown in detail, the chapels, the art treasures, the libraries with their miles of shelves loaded with rare books and priceless manuscripts, the gardens, the radio station, the modern shops, the stores, the living quarters, the post office, the fire and police departments and the printing presses of the tiny Papal State are shown to the millions who have longed to visit Vatican City.

Among the unforgettable sights brought to the screen are the Sistine Chapel, the masterpieces of the Vatican galleries, the Basilica of St. Peter's, the mural of Michelangelo and the crypts under the cathedral where the popes are buried. Numerous scenes show the daily life of the thousand employees of the Vatican, their constant work of restoration, the library, the colleges, the mosaic maker and the scientific efforts that have succeeded in saving the masterpieces of art on wall and ceiling.

Even more impressive is the presentation of the cardinals and other officials of the church, the religious orders, the Noble Guard and Papal Gendarmes, the Swiss Guard, the students in Roman colleges from every country in the world and the pilgrims from every corner of the globe. The North American college at Rome, the alma mater of many priests of the Rochester Diocese is among the many buildings shown in "The Story of the Vatican."

INTERESTS ALL FAITHS

The story of the Vatican presents to the world the work hours of Christendom at a time when nations are looking to Rome for guidance, and is the best available for a visit to the center of Christendom. In it will be seen the treasures and mysteries of centuries revealed; places even the most privileged have never seen; the masterpieces by the world's immortal artists; and Monsignor Sheen will be heard describing the Eternal City as only he could do it.

The Story of the Vatican is of interest to non-Catholics as well as Catholics. Walter Winchell says "It will inspire you regardless of race, color or creed. The March of Time feature narrated by Msgr. Fulton J. Sheen is dramatic masterpiece of the grandeur that is Rome." The San Francisco Chronicle says "That it is a film that Catholics and non-Catholics alike will find interesting."

The Catholic Daughters of America are sponsoring the Story of the Vatican and all proceeds derived from the presentation will be given to them. The admission price is 35 cents including tax for adults and 25 cents for children.
