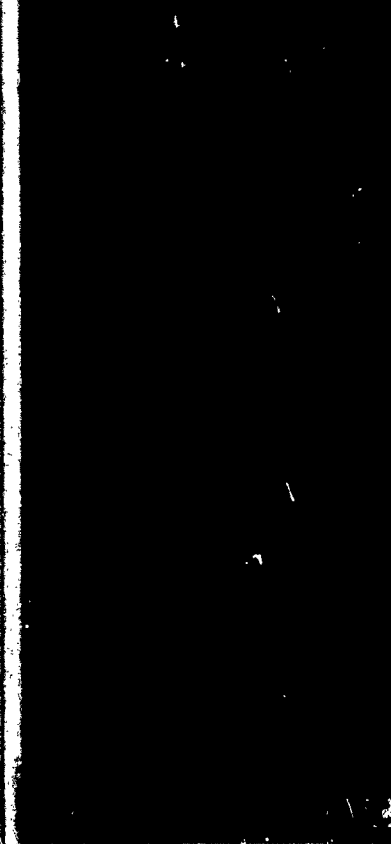

WAR CORRESPONDENTS LAID

PRIEST'S WORK WITH AIR SOLDIERS OVERSEAS

MONTREAL—The work of the Rev. Daniel Bernabe, who holds the rank of Flight Lieutenant with a squadron of French Canadians in the Royal Canadian Air Force overseas, in sustaining the morale of his men has drawn the praise of officers.

Bernabe was correspondent for the Montreal Daily Star in a recent dispatch, which said that the Bernabe's work has been so effective that "all seemed an earthly peace-time—the temperature is soaring."

The correspondent said Father Bernabe had put a group of men to be inspired for his language, in effect and a policy of firm collection has without missing a moment.
