Thomas F. Woodlock Awarded Laetare Medal By Notre Dame U.

NOTRE DAME, Ind. (NC) — Thomas F. Woodlock, distinguished New York author and Editor of the Wall Street Journal, was announced on Apr. 4, Laetare Sunday, as the recipient of the Laetare Medal awarded annually since 1883 by the University of Notre Dame to an outstanding Catholic layman in the United States.

Mr. Woodlock was one of the principal speakers at the dinner closing the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems in Rochester on Sept. 24, 1940. In announcing the selection of the sixty-first medalist, the Very Rev. Hugh O'Donnell, President of the University, said:

"Notre Dame honors Mr. Woodlock as one of the most vigorous and effective apologists among the Catholic laity of America over a long period of years. Moreover, this same ability and integrity have characterized his work with the Wall Street Journal and the Interstate Commerce Commission, bringing high principle and excellent example into the heart of the business and economic life of this country.
