Navy Chaplain Spurs K. C. Chaplains' Aid Campaign

Helping men to be better men as they build for tomorrow is the work of the chaplain in service, Chaplain Joseph B. McDonald, with rank of Lieutenant, told members of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, as they opened their Chaplains Aid Campaign, Thursday evening, Apr. 1.

A member of Pere Marquette Council, Knights of Columbus, the Chaplain who is stationed at Sampson Naval Training Station, declared himself right at home with the knights at their meeting in the K. of C. Club Rooms, Columbus Civic Centre.

Working with the men who are being trained to carry on the fight of today, the Chaplain is helping the men of tomorrow who will become an important factor in the democracy—they are fighting to save, Chaplain McDonald said.

Encouragement to the knights in their part in the \$25,000 War Bond campaign of the entire order was given by the speaker who told Chairman Leo F. Rowland that he could put him down for a bond to be purchased during the drive.

Both the Chaplains' Aid campaign, a state-wide project in charge of Frank M. Boonstra here and the War Bond Drive, a national effort, will be given the support of Rochester Auxiliary, Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus, and of Mount Carmel, Order of the Alhambra, it was announced by Grand Knight Thomas H. O'Connor.

Committees from the two organizations have been named by Grand Commander Norman A. O'Brien of the Alhambra and Faithful Navigator Joseph A. Murphy of the Fourth Degree.

The Chaplains' Aid campaign will end on Easter Sunday and all money collected throughout the state will be presented to His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, State Chaplain, as a testimonial gift. Bishop Kearney will then present the entire fund to Bishop John P. O'Hara, D.D., Military Director of the Armed Forces for distribution among the chaplains.

The name of Rochester Council will be attached to the Chaplains' Aid which are purchased by the money raised here.

Reports on both campaigns are being received by Asst. Financial Secretary Thomas C. McCarthy in the K. of C. office, Columbus Civic Centre.
