NEW YORK (NC) — The link

Problems of Labor Now Loom Large On Washington Horizon

WASHINGTON (NC)—The problem of labor is looming large on the Washington horizon. It is not merely a question of leading workers to man the war plants, and raise the wages

Prominent Persons Honor Editor of Publication Which Attacks Catholics

NEW YORK (NC)—Kenneth Loeble, editor of The Protestant, a publication which has run numerous articles attacking the Catholic Church, was honored by a large gathering of prominent persons.

The Most Rev. J. Francis A. Moran, Auxiliary Bishop of New York, speaking before the Catholic Trade Unionists, attacked the meeting without referring to it by name, as a deliberate provocation of "warfare."

Mr. Loeble's message lauded Mr. Moran as "a militant, energetic and fighting Protestant," whose "brilliant and courageous leadership is responsible for the very survival of Protestantism in this country."

In reply, Mr. Loeble said in part: "It is our immediate duty without further delay to bring this war into an anti-fascist war, securing our ties with Spain and Finland and ending a hostile front that will establish a basis for understanding and confidence between Russia and the West."

General Good Health Reported Of U. S. Prisoners In Italy

VATICAN CITY.—An reliable reports indicate that the Americans who arrive in Italy as prisoners of war are generally in good health and enjoy excellent spiritual assistance. The Vatican Information Office for War Prisoners continues to cable to the Apostolic Delegation in Washington at the earliest possible moment, after their arrival in Italy, news about American prisoners and the state of their health.

The camp in which Americans are detained are reported to be becoming better equipped every day. The Italian authorities are said to be showing great interest in and consideration for the welfare of the prisoners, and the serene and traditional good humor of Americans is said to be evident everywhere.

Advocates Speed Up Plan For Grade School

CHICAGO.—Many are pressing eight-year, eight-grade elementary schools, but arrangements so that bright pupils can go through the eight grades in seven or even in six years without skipping or eliminating any subject matter.

This suggestion was offered by the Rev. Charles E. Kowal, member of the National Catholic Educational Association Committee on Reorganization, in the keynote address of the National National meeting, College and University Department of the N. C. E. A., here.

The speaker advocated "speeding up the subject matter of the present eight grades and concentrating all essentials in six or eight years, having six-year plans for eight and seven-year plans for seven."
