

Faithful Prepare To Observe Holy Week's Solemnity

Bishop Will Officiate
At Cathedral Rites
Opening Holy Thursday

Solemn services of Holy Week with their significance increased by war's demands on the "Prayer Power" will open throughout the diocese next week with the Palm Sunday rites.

His Excellency, the Most Rev. James B. Leavelle, D.D., Bishop of the Diocese, will officiate in Holy Thursday and Good Friday and will bless the Palms at St. Bernard's Seminary of a Pontifical Mass on Palm Sunday at 9 A. M. In all the other churches of the diocese, the solemn devotions of Holy Week will be carried out on the faithful are given opportunity to meditate on the suffering and death of the Redeemer so significantly brought out in the liturgy. Three Holy Services.

The Rev. Dominick Grande, C.P. of New York will be at Sacred Heart Cathedral on Good Friday where at 12 o'clock noon His Excellency, the Bishop will offer the Mass of the Precrucified. Services during the Three Hours at the Cathedral will consist of the Sermon on the Passion, Stations of the Cross, and meditation.

On Holy Thursday, the Bishop will officiate at Coleman Pontifical Mass and the Blessing of the Holy Oil at 10:15 A. M. The Ten Hours will be sung in the presence of the Bishop at St. Bernard's Seminary students at 4 P. M. The Rt. Rev. Mgr. J. V. Goggin will be master of ceremonies at the Pontifical services. In the evening at 8 P. M. a Holy Hour before the Repose will be conducted.

The Rt. Rev. Mgr. George Y. Burns, pastor of the Cathedral announced that Holy Communion will be distributed Holy Thursday morning at 6, 6:30, 7, 7:30, 8, 8:30 and 9 P. M.

Men's Holy Hour
At St. Patrick's Church, Plymouth Ave. North, on Holy Thursday evening at 8 P. M., his Excellency will conduct the Holy Hour of the Nocturnal Adoration Society.

Services on Holy Saturday will begin at 7 A. M. with Monks' Mass, officiating. They will consist of Blessing of the New Fire, Blessing of the Paschal Candle and Blessing of the Baptismal and Easter Water and the Mass of Holy Saturday.

Bishop Kearney will officiate at St. Andrew's Church on Good Friday at 7:45 P. M. The sermon will be preached by the Rev. Dominick Grande, C.P.

Solemn Pontifical Mass will be celebrated on Easter Sunday at 12:15 P. M. by the Bishop and Father Donahoe will preach the Easter Sermon. The Cathedral Men's Choir, directed by Raymond J. Macanone will sing the joyous Easter music.
