'Dear Folks'

John Collins, apprentice seaman, Sampson Naval Training Station (home parish, St. John the Evangelist's, Rochester):

"I just came from Mass. It was beautiful. We had it in the drill hall, which is a massive structure with the floor about the size of a football field and no posts, all clear floor space.

"A big cupboard in the wall opens up into a sanctuary with a small altar and stage. The sermon is said over the air by big amplifiers. A small electric organ is played by one of the sailors. Two other sailors are altar boys.

"It looks good to see all these young men in blue going to Mass (about 750 men at one Mass). The Mass had an ominous feeling to it, too. I had to stand and I was right in front of a gun rack containing about 400 rifles. Somehow the Holy Mass doesn't seem to tie up to such things as guns and ships.

"I did a lot of thinking at that Mass and for the first time it really held a deep meaning for me. At the end when closing prayers were being said, 'St. Michael, the Archangel, defend us in battle, etc.' suddenly struck home and I realized that he is indeed our patron saint."

OPA Checks Restaurant Prices

Rochester OPA was notified today that the New York Regional office moved weekly on Apr. 13 to prevent price increases in every eating and drinking establishment in the country, following a Washington price control order effective Sunday.

Copies of the order entitled "Fixing of Prices by Restaurants and Similar Establishments; Delegation of Authority To Fix Maximum Prices," was an explanatory letter from Administrator Prentiss M. Brown, who has sent Dunham S. Baker, Jr., Rochester price official, to all local rationing boards and district offices in Rochester which includes New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Maryland, Delaware and the District of Columbia.

Boards are instructed to see that proprietors of every establishment within their jurisdiction where food or beverages are sold receive a copy of the Brown letter. In accordance with the general order, the letter directs that such proprietor shall file with his local board before May 1st a list of prices charged for all items of food and drink sold by him during the seven-day period between Apr. 4 and 10.

"The purpose of this filing," Mr. Baker stated, "is to establish a price base period for the guidance of the Regional Administrator, Sylvan L. Joseph, New York, in ordering a freeze of restaurant prices in any area where such action may be deemed necessary."
