Founded May 21, 1912, at Dodge City, where a group of friends, other lawyers, Second Avenue, James Martin O'Hearn and Walter Almond, met with a former boxer, Antonio Urdaneta, President because of his liberal political and economic ideas. In the beginning they decided to form a "Team" which would fight to restore to Mexico the Christian social order. This is the origin of the National Council of the United States.

A National Committee directs the entire movement. It has divided the country into Regional Committees more or less according to the different sections and has 400 such Regional Committees. The latter controlling the State and County Committees.

TERMS DEFINED
To be a Sinarquist is to be a missionary; it is to sustain Christ's cause at your hand against the poverty and toil of the poor; it is to combat that which is division and corruption; it is to maintain faith and unstained efforts in only that which serves the common good. Sinarquism is only peace, order, stability of spirit. It is essentially Mexican and absolutely incompatible with all totalitarianism.

Sinarquism is not a political party; it has declared many times that it does not desire to participate in public matters, but that it is determined to cooperate in all activities which aid the general welfare of the people. The principles of Sinarquism are those of peace and harmony; that is why Sinarquism condemns all revolutionary movements.

JUSTICE FOR ALL!

Sinarquist meetings are gatherings of Mexicans who in a democratic, orderly, peaceful and law-abiding manner, unite to seek "Justice for all" and the "restoration of social order." Sinarquist, according to their rule, attend all their meetings entirely unarmed.

Sinarquism considers that in general the division of the large agricultural properties and above all the creation of small holdings is indispensable, and has so stated in its program.

Sinarquism has undertaken the gigantic task of rehabilitating national agriculture.

To realize its educational program, its technical program, its community constructive program, its program of redemption for the people, Sinarquism deems it necessary to cooperate with the President of the Republic, who has announced, for the first time in many years, his desire to "govern for all" and since he has not found it inexpedient to confess his religious faith.

The major effort of the educational program of Sinarquism will be centered in the rural districts, since 70% of the national population lives off the land and it is this great peasant class which has been deceived and most led astray by the Revolution. Rural education, to Sinarquism, is the first step that must be taken towards the reconstruction of Mexico and its concern is not only for the education of the peasant children but also, with equal interest, the education of adult persons, which it proposes tirelessly to promote.

Sinarquism is truly endeavoring to cooperate with the attitude and point of view of the United States and hopes, in turn, that the United States will constantly keep in mind the position of Mexico, her traditions and the religious faith of her people, without attempting to superimpose a culture foreign to it. President Roosevelt himself has declared that democracy is wherever found, the defense of liberty, of tolerance, of decency and of law, and it is toward exactly these ideals that Sinarquism moves. —From "Sinarquism."
