Holy Name Hear Fr. Brien Talk On Youth Delinquency

Seventy-five members of the Holy Name Society of Our Lady of Lourdes Church, heard the Rev. William J. Brien speak on the topic "Juvenile Delinquency," at the annual Communion breakfast held Sunday, April 12, at the Mark Twain Hotel.

Emphasizing the problem of juvenile delinquency resulting from war conditions, Father Brien noted from the report of J. Edgar Hoover, director of the FBI on the increase of delinquency, he represented the problem as a challenge to Catholic parenthood to combat the menace to the family structure by bringing up their children from infancy in the Catholic belief, in strict obedience and under proper authority.

He closed his talk with a reading of the letter written by Commander John J. Shea to his 5-year-old son, before he was killed in action in the South Pacific.

The Rev. Leo G. Schwab, moderator of the society, spoke in few words. Edward McGarrett, president, reported a membership increase to 148. Rev. Clarence Gardner gave the benediction. Edward Brown was toastmaster.
