### Lenten Sermon

"Hope" was the subject of the Lenten sermon given by the Rev. William Deyraux of Newark, at the regular devotion last Sunday evening at St. Ann's Church.

Father Deyraux, in clarifying the two sins against the virtue of Hope, explained that presumption insults God's preception in the supposition that the individual seeks to receive God by living as he chooses, still expecting God's mercy. This distorted sense of Hope is the result of a weak Faith.

Despair, Father Deyraux explained, is not a new falling, since intellectual blackouts have existed for numerous years, and have been brought about by the world's substitution of Humanism for Theology. Despair, Father Deyraux declared, is the fruit of free thought.
