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SINARQUISM

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Sinarquism was started May 23, 1927, at Leon, Guanajuato, when a group of friends, three lawyers, Manuel Zamora, Juan Trujillo Olvera and Salvador Alvarado, met with a farmer, Jose Antonio Urquiza. Disturbed because of the mixed political and economic disorder reigning in the Republic, they decided to form a Legion which would fight to restore in Mexico the Christian social order. This is the origin of the National Sinarquist Legion.

A National Committee directs the entire movement. It has divided the country into Regional Committees more or less according to the different States; and in turn each Regional Committee controls the Municipal Committees, the latter controlling the Rural Sub-Committees.

TERM DEFINED
To be a Sinarquist is to be a visionary; it is to acquaint oneself at first hand with the poverty and hopes of the poor; it is to combat that which debases and corrupts; it is to maintain faith and sustained efforts in only that which serves the common good. Sinarquism is unity, peace, order, it is militancy of spirit, it is eminently Mexican and absolutely incompatible with all sectarianisms.

Sinarquism is not a political party; it has declared many times that it does not desire to participate in public matters, but that it is disposed to cooperate in all activities which seek the general welfare of the people.

The principles of Sinarquism are those of peace and harmony; that is why Sinarquism condemns all revolutionary movements.

'JUSTICE FOR ALL'
Sinarquist meetings are gatherings of Mexicans who in a democratic, orderly, peaceful and law-abiding manner, unite to ask "justice for all" and the "restoration of social order." Sinarquists, according to their rule, attend all their meetings entirely unarmed. Sinarquism considers that in general the division of the large agricultural properties and above all the creation of small holdings is indispensable, and has so stated in its program.

Sinarquism has undertaken the gigantic task of rehabilitating national agriculture. To realize its educational program, its technical program, its eminently constructive program, its program of redemption for the people, Sinarquism deems it necessary to cooperate with the President of the Republic, who has announced, for the first time in many years, his desire to "govern for all" and since he has not found it independent to renounce his religious faith.

The major effort of the educational program of Sinarquism will be centered in the rural districts, since 70% of the national population lives off the land, and it is this great peasant class which has been deceived and must be led astray by the Revolution. Rural education, to Sinarquism, is the first step that must be taken towards the reconstruction of Mexico and its concern is not only for the education of the peasant children but also, with equal interest, the education of adult peasants, which it proposes (insistently) to promote.

Sinarquism is loyally endeavoring to cooperate with the attitude and point of view of the United States and hopes, in turn, that the United States will constantly keep in mind the position of Mexico, her traditions and the religious faith of her people, without attempting to superimpose a culture foreign to it. President Roosevelt himself has declared that democracy is wherever found, the defense of liberty, of tolerance, of decency and of faith and it is toward exactly these ideals that Sinarquism moves.—Eugen Sinarquism

Social Security Card Advice Given Workers

Nearly 2,000,000 duplicate account cards were issued throughout the country by the Social Security Board during last year at a cost of \$300,700, Kenneth Haxton, manager of the Social Security Board field office in Rochester, announced today. More than 11,000 of these duplicate cards were issued in the Rochester area alone at an estimated cost of \$400.00.

"Every time a worker loses his social security account card and has to get one duplicated, he is wasting not only his own man-power hours, but also the hours and money that could have been spent to promote war efforts," Haxton said. He asked that holders of social security cards safeguard them as a wartime conservation measure and gave the following suggestions:

Don't carry the card with you unless you must, and you must carry it with you when applying for a new position. If you change jobs frequently and need to carry your card with you, don't stuff it into a pocket. Never keep your card in your overall or shirt pockets. Many losses occur because the shirt or the overalls together with the card are tossed into the laundry.

Keep a record of your card at home—keep the bottom half of your card with valuable records.

If you can give your correct number when applying for a duplicate, you can get your duplicate much quicker. "Seldom is an automobile or driver's license lost," Haxton said, "because a charge is made for furnishing a duplicate and the Government may make a charge for duplicate account cards if workers are not more concerned about taking care of them." An account number is the number of the worker's Old Age and Survivors Insurance policy. If the employer does not have the number for reporting purposes the worker gets no credit for the premium paid through the employer. "I do not believe," Haxton said, "that in general workers throw their insurance policies into the laundry or put them away in places where they are unable to find them."
