Joyous Rites To Mark Feast Of Resurrection In Diocese Churches

Diocesan-wide observance of the Feast of the Resurrection will be observed in the Diocese of Rochester at 12:15 P. M. (noon) at Sacred Heart Cathedral.

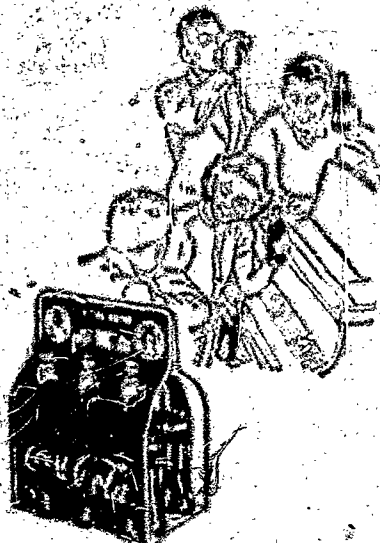
In every church of the diocese there will be appropriate services by Pastor Charles Made symbols of the hope that rises through the world by commemoration of the Redeemer's triumph over sin and death will be held.

At the cathedral the Bishop will be assisted in the Cathedral ceremony by the Rt. Rev. Messrs. George V. Baran, pastor, as Assistant Prefect and by priests of the cathedral. The special Easter music at Sacred Heart Cathedral will be sung by the Cathedral Men's Choir directed by Raymond J. Hausman, who is also Aquinas Institute's musical director.

The Men's Choir will sing the "Easter Chorale" composed by Mr. Hausman and dedicated to Bishop Kearney as the Spelman Pontifical services open.

The Three Hour services on Good Friday will begin at noon with the Mass of the Precious Blood being celebrated by the Bishop. The services will be conducted by Pastor Humbale Grande.
