History Survey's Results Studied At Verein Session

Results of the survey recently made by the New York Times of 7,000 freshmen in some 36 universities and colleges of the country in the matter of knowledge of American history, and comments on the survey made by the heads of various colleges and teachers of American history in the country were discussed by the Catholic Central Verein of America, Rochester Branch, at its regular monthly meeting held last Sunday afternoon.

The occasion of the reference to the Times survey was consideration by the Branch of the resolution adopted at the national convention in St. Louis last August and entitled "Historical Study Students Deficient".

The survey showed, as was pointed out, an appalling lack of knowledge on the part of present day freshmen of American history, also America geography as it pertains to history. The occasion of the resolution was a survey made a year ago by the New York Times among college students, which resulted in shocking conditions similar to the present survey.

Reference was also made to the lack of knowledge on the part of freshmen of the importance of acquiring not only a record of names, dates and events, but in particular a record or appreciation of the spirit of the great events, and the great men that figured in those events.

Stress was laid on this part of the resolution, which reads, "It is imperative that we view history not merely as a secular subject, but as the revelation of God's Providence in time. In other words, we must promote a Christian philosophy of history."

Stress Philosophy.
The importance of emphasizing

the philosophy of history was pointed out and it was contended that if the teaching of history is to be really effective, the important part that the past has played must be kept in mind. The saying of Lord Acton that in order to understand the present you must be familiar with at least 200 years of past history was referred to. The frame of the resolution had in mind the importance of a people's past when it shared the resolution with the following:

"Knowledge of a people's past is essential to those shaping the present and planning for the future. It was a distinguished American who said: 'As the past of an organism decides its future, so the future of a people is already written in its past.' And that past should be known to every serious student citizen of our great republic."

Reports of the meeting of the executive committee of the state held at Syracuse Apr. 4 were made.

Final arrangements were made for the celebration of the Great Labor Encyclicals of Pope Leo XIII and Pope Pius XI, which will take place on May 18 in St. Joseph's Hall. This celebration is particularly important in view of the conditions prevailing in the country and in the world at large in regard to labor. The importance of acquiring an approach to this question as set forth in the Great Labor Encyclicals "cannot be too strongly emphasized."
