

Children Join Holy Childhood Centenary Observance With Novena, Stamp Drive

Children of the Catholic Church of the Diocese of Rochester will join thousands of other children of the United States in the observance of the one hundredth anniversary of the founding of the Pontifical Association of the Holy Childhood. The Holy Childhood Association is a mission organization established primarily for children and in Rochester is under the direction of the Rev. John S. Randall.

Observance of the anniversary will be a spiritual one and will take the form of a novena of thanksgiving in honor of the Holy Child on May 3, the Feast of the Spring of the Holy Child.

Stamp Drive
The observance in Rochester has been planned by a committee of three for the sale of war stamps to be used for the purchase of a million stamps. The proceeds of the stamp and the mission treasury to which it is to be credited is to be distributed by the way of the school children participating in the drive.

His Excellency, the Most Rev. Amleto Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States, commencing the observance of the anniversary by a novena of thanksgiving writes: "It affords me great pleasure to offer my heartfelt congratulations on the occasion of the hundredth anniversary of the Pontifical Association of the Holy Childhood. May the Infant Jesus grant that through this Association the missionary efforts of our Catholic youth will rise to new successes and so reap abundant fruits in the worldwide fields of action of our heroic missionaries.

Novena Commenced
"It is particularly gratifying to learn that the centenary will be observed chiefly by a novena of prayer throughout the nation during the month of Our Lady. I am confident that under the zealous and inspiring guidance of the Directors and teaching religious the children of the Association will by their fervent prayers offer a fitting tribute of gratitude to the Blessed Lord and His associate mother for the blessing enjoyed by the Association during these hundred years, and so also insure the favor of divine protection in the years to come."
In addition to an act of thanksgiving, the novena also will be made in behalf of the spiritual and temporal welfare of the Sovereign Pontiff, the Supreme Head of the Association.



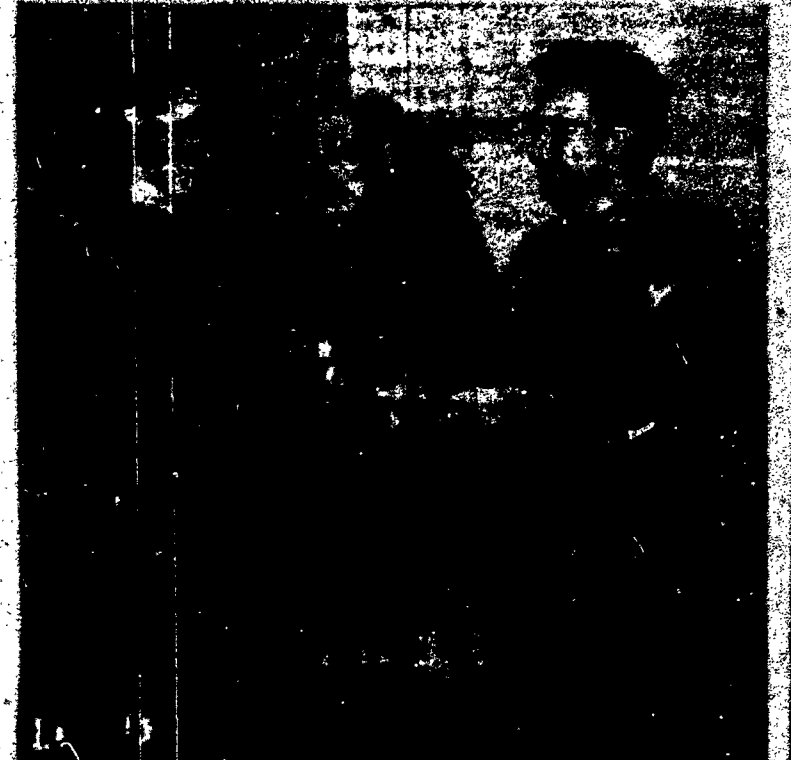
U. S. Priest Misses Bus In China, Escapes Bombing By Japanese

CHUNGKING, China.—It sometimes pays to miss the bus. At least, so thinks Father Francis Keelan, a Maryknoll South China missionary from Waverly, Mass. Father Keelan was leaving Kweilin, where he is stationed to go to the country to say Mass for a group of university students who are continuing their studies free from the rain of Japanese bombs.

The priest arrived at the Kweilin bus depot just in time to see the machine leaving in a swirl of dust. He was somewhat disappointed but, an hour later, was thanking his lucky stars. Eight Japanese planes caught the bus on the open road outside the city. They dived and strafed it. When they had finished it was a blazing wreck. Six passengers were killed and the nine remaining occupants seriously wounded.

Father Keelan has only been in Kweilin a few weeks for he spent last year in a Japanese concentration camp in Hongkong and was only recently released. He has to make a long roundabout journey to get to Free China.
