EASTER BLESSINGS

May the fullness of Easter blessings be with you on the coming Sunday! Let your faith take you back over the years to the very day of the Resurrection. Feel with the followers of the Christ of Calvary the anguish of heart, the loss of hope, the utter desolation, that followed the last three hours of His life. Be present with them as that anguish gradually gives way to renewed joy in His presence, that loss of hope bows before evident fulfillment of the promised resurrection, that utter desolation makes way for the unending joy of the Easter Greeting, "Halleluia," "My Master!"

God's power is triumphant this Easter morning! On this day by His omnipotent might, the Father has through His only begotten Son, overcome death, has opened up to us the gate of everlasting life.

The historic record tells us clearly and candidly what the eyes of the witnesses of the resurrection actually beheld, what the senses of the followers of Christ truly perceived, what the people of Jerusalem knew as the great event of Easter day and of the forty days following. His friends knew it and rejoiced with new courage. His enemies knew it and strove to combat it with new wickedness. Christ died on Friday; Christ was alive again on Easter morning and on all the days following. 1900 years have witnessed the effect of the Resurrection on the world and on men in the spread of the religion of Christ, a faith based on the certainty of the Resurrection in the minds of the Apostles and of their disciples.

Our Easter prayer is to God the Father, that He Who by anticipating grace breathes good desires into our hearts, may by His continued help bring those desires into fruitful effect. Our good desires this year will have to do with an early end of the war through a just and lasting peace. Those desires will take form in earnest prayer for all that suffer through the war, for God's blessing on all who fight so bravely for preservation of those freedoms He gave unto man, for a resurrection unto liberty of all those who have for a time fallen under the killing power of the despot, the dictator, the destroyer. The Risen Saviour is our guarantee that our prayer shall be heard, that Easter of 1943 shall surely find us nearer the happy day when all men can once more breathe in comfort and confidence God's own spirit of Christian liberty. May these be the Easter Blessings of 1943!

WORTHY OF A BETTER CAUSE

There is little in Communism for us to admire, and nothing in Communism for Americans to adhere to. Our laws recognize that a Communist can not be a true American, and our love for liberty instinctively makes us reject the pagan teachings of Communism. Russian courage and determination in this war have given us a picture of what a patriotic home-loving people can accomplish even in the face of all the difficulties and limitations a minority communist government has placed upon them. What greater possibilities would present themselves were these brave Russian soldiers freed from pagan influence and given a government based on respect for the Four Freedoms?

But one must admire the persistence and the determination of the lowly Communist to make his system prevail. There may be half-hearted comrades here and there, there may be lukewarm fellow-travelers in this or that place, but they are marked by their scarcity. Usually a Communist is a zealot for his cause, still anxious to overcome past defeat, present difficulties, future dangers. He is working now to get the Allied Powers to injure their own cause by attacking France in Spain, forgetting that the forces of Communism went down to definite defeat in the recent Spanish War; he has looked blatantly blistering the alleged poor record of Franco as ruler of Spain, which say nothing of the contrast that record presents with the tale of devastation of the suppressed people of Russia under Communism; he has friendly reviewers who can see no good in things that are not red; he has his friends in the press, and in the magazines. Only the good sense, the reasoned judgment, of the average American, protects him against this one-sided campaign of propaganda.

Now the Reds are out after "The Fifth Seal," a book soon to be brought out by the Book-of-the-Month Club. The Daily Worker demands it be withdrawn "because it is subtly and viciously anti-Soviet." Many of them who have protested have not read the book, as shown in the case where Mr. Morley let one such person to state she was opposed to a chapter not in the book, and to a character not in it; other passages equally objectionable as one you mention.

Catholics might well emulate their communist neighbors in zeal for the defense of and the spread of the Christian Faith. If faith in things that are entirely temporal calls for such support from Communists, why should not the eternal faith of Jesus Christ lead Christians to at least like support of the Church that has given the world its basic culture?

ANOINT JESUS

The Easter Gospel starts out with preparation—not for the resurrection, but rather for the permanent entombment of Jesus. Had the Apostles and disciples and the holy women maintained strong faith in Christ's promise that He would rise again, they would have prepared for this glorious event. They would have secured the assembly of all true friends of Christ to be ready at the tomb for this stupendous impending event. But it was not multitudes, it was no cavalcade, it was no grand procession, that set forth very early on Sunday, the first day of the week, to visit the tomb. It was a tiny group, a group made up of the two Marys, Magdalen and the mother of James, and

What is the Meaning of the Easter Bunny as a Christian Symbol?

The Easter Bunny is a symbol of new life and the ability to sleep with its eyes open. These characteristics are allegorically applied to the Resurrection of our Lord. Life is manifested by motion, death is likened to sleep. The rabbit rising from death is thus suggested by the bunny in which the eye, the symbol of the soul, remains open even while the body sleeps. In the Catholic and especially in the decorations of the Easter architecture the symbol of the rabbit is used frequently as a sign of Christ rising from the sleep of death.

Why Do Catholics Have Such a High Regard for the Pope?

With few exceptions, they have ever been men of exalted virtue.
