

# First Easter Rites Set For Navy Men At Sampson

SAMPSON, N. Y.—An elaborate program of Protestant and Catholic services has been completed for observance of Holy Week and Easter at the U. S. Naval Training Station here. The Jewish Passover also will be observed with traditional services during the same week.

This is the first Church Holy Season to occur since the Station has been in full operation and the program developed by Commander William V. Edel (USN) USN, Honor Chaplain, is an extraordinary one to be found in a city of such large size.

Arrangements have been completed for a total of 64 Catholic and 60 Protestant services during Holy Week. Commander Edel said that his would compare favorably with the total for a city of the population of Sampson. Total attendance at all services is expected to reach 100,000 or about what might be expected in a city

of a quarter of a million people.

Both Catholic and Protestant services will be held several times each day beginning with Palm Sunday and extending through Easter in all the recruit units of the station. Of special interest are arrangements for Good Friday and Easter. On the former, all troops of the station chaplain will participate in services. In addition, recruits who are ordained ministers will give the "Meditation On the Seven Last Words" at a service in each of the five recruit areas.

A feature of the Easter program will be an evening service in Marine Memorial Chapel with a mixed choir of 100 recruits drawn from all the recruit units.
