

First Easter Rites Set For Navy Men At Sampson

SAMPSON, N. Y.—An elaborate program of Protestant and Catholic services has been completed for observance of Holy Week and Easter at the U. S. Naval Training Station here. The Jewish Synagogue also will be observed with traditional services during the same week.

This is the first Church Holy Week to occur since the Station has been in full operation and the program developed by Commander William W. Dill (USN) USN, Senior Chaplain, is as comprehensive as would be found in a city of much larger size.

Arrangements have been completed for a total of 40 Catholic and Protestant services during Holy Week. Commander Dill said that this would compare favorably with the total for a city of the population of Sampson. Total attendance at all services is expected to reach 10,000 or about what might be expected in a city of a million population.

Both Catholic and Protestant services will be held several times each day beginning with Palm Sunday and extending through Easter in all the several units of the station. Of special interest are arrangements for Good Friday and Easter. On the latter, all twenty of the station chaplains will participate in services. In addition, services will be conducted in the mess halls and other quarters. The "Station for the Ocean Land" will be a service to each of the five mess halls.

A feature of the Easter program will be an evening service in Hayes Memorial Chapel with a musical choir of 20 recruits drawn from all the recruit units.

Would Continue Liberal Education

CHICAGO—Advocating a continuation of liberal education for our people during our time, the Rev. Edward J. Rooney, C.S.C., director of the Jesuit Educational Association, in an article titled "Will It To the Army and Navy" in the current issue of The National Schools published here, asserts the time has come for the country's educators to do "some bold and courageous thinking and speaking" to accomplish this purpose.

The article points out that the nation's educators had no time after Pearl Harbor in placing educational institutions at the disposal of the Army and Navy in specialized programs to go away entirely with liberal education for the war duration is criticized by Father Rooney.

"Never was there a time when bold and courageous thinking and speaking were more necessary on the part of educators since never before have they been faced with so difficult a problem," Father Rooney asserts in advocating some retention of liberal education to train youths to win the peace.

Carmelite Nuns Toil In Own Victory Garden

NEW YORK.—Seven Carmelite nuns and three postulants are planting a victory garden in a one and-a-half acre plot at the rear of St. Patrick's Home for the Aged and Infirm here.

The plot, which was formerly a lawn, is being planted with potatoes, onions, carrots, cabbages and other kitchen vegetables which will be used in the home. It is the first time the Sisters have planted and tended a vegetable garden at the institution.

JAPS FREE IRISH PRIESTS HELD IN KOREA 3 MONTHS

DUBLIN.—All Irish priests in Korea, who were arrested the day after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor have been freed after being interned for three months in the Church at Kwangju, a letter received from a repatriated American missionary, the Rev. James Henry, revealed.

The letter was addressed to the parents of an Irish priest, who reside in Ashbourne, County Meath. The letter revealed the decision to liberate the priests was based on their neutrality. During the internment, Father Henry's letter said, the priests were treated well and there was no scarcity of food. The Bishop as well as four Irish priests in the area were arrested when war was declared.

PROPOSES DIVORCE CASES BE SENT TO HIGHER COURTS

OTTAWA.—Senator G. W. Robinson, chairman of the Senate divorce committee, told members of the Senate that steps may be taken shortly to transfer Quebec divorce applications from the Senate to the higher courts of Quebec.

At present all provinces of Canada, except Quebec, have divorce courts. Since Quebec has not put its machinery into practice, consequently the only divorce applications now heard by the Senate committee are those from Quebec and P. E. I.

Cleveland.—The Rev. Francis J. McNamee, Navy chaplain and formerly assistant pastor of St. Ignace and St. Malachi Churches here, is being held prisoner by the Japanese in the Philippines Islands, the Navy Department has notified his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bernard F. McNamee, of this city.
