GENEVA—Lieutenant August Cervini of the United States Naval Training Station at Sampson, N. Y., guest speaker at the annual Easter breakfast of the St. Stephen's

The bulletin contains articles and pictures emphasizing the importance of buying stamps and bonds.

Miss Regina J. Sweeney, chairman of Junior Red Cross, reports that the sale of stamps and bonds has been greatly accelerated during the past month. Every school has tried to aid in the thirteen million war loan drive. St. Stephen's School which has held the lead in the city schools for some time moved into second position this past week with Geneva High School taking first place. De Sales High School was third and St. Francis de Sales School was fourth.
