WASHINGTON.—A book titled "25 Years of Unconquered" by the Rev. Dr. Edgar Schmiedeler, D.D., Director of the Family Life Bureau, National Catholic Welfare Conference, has been published and deals with the first quarter-century of efforts of the organized birth control movement. In composing the book, Dr. Schmiedeler has drawn upon the numerous articles he has written from both secular and Catholic publications in refuting the various contentions of the birth control movement. Containing 180

pages, the chapters of the book are entitled: "Popularizing the Birth Control," "Holding Society," "Raising Youth," "Working Around the Law," "Putting It Over," "Strategy — Mostly Backdoor," "The Economic," "Health and Religion," "History and Unconquered," and "The Next 25 Years." The book was published by the Our Sunday Visitor Press, of Huntington, Ind.

Desserts with Small Measures of Sugar

Desserts are important to present day menus when meat servings are cut to the measure of ration points. An appealing dessert adds much nutritive value to a meal when milk, eggs, fruits and cereals are made into the delicious pudding or "pie" that pep-up family spirits and adds morale to the family dinner.

"Package Desserts are a saving of both time and sugar. Use these prepared mixes.

Gingerbread Mix, Chocolate Cake Mix, Biscuit Mix for Shortcakes, Flavored Gelatins — Orange, Lemon, Raspberry, etc., Vanilla Pudding, Butterscotch Pudding, Chocolate Fudding.

Raspberry Pudding
1 pkg. raspberry gelatine, 1 c. boiling water, 1 c. cold water, 1 pkg. vanilla pudding, 2 c. milk.
1. Prepare vanilla pudding from directions on box. Chill.
2. Dissolve gelatine in boiling water, add cold water and chill.
3. When gelatine begins to set, heat with Dover egg beater until it reaches the consistency of beaten egg white.
4. Fold beaten gelatine into chilled vanilla pudding. Turn into serving dishes or molds and chill until firm. 10 servings.

Cake Pudding
3 cups stale cake crumbs, 1 cup milk, 1 egg, 2 tbs. sugar, 1 tsp. any desired flavoring, 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. baking powder.
1. Soak cake crumbs for 10 min. in milk.
2. Beat together the egg, sugar and flavoring; add salt, baking powder and milk mixture.
3. Pour into buttered baking dish, set in hot water and bake at 350-375° until firm.

ON THE HOME FRONT

A WOMEN'S TRANSFORMATION

Houses of glass are realities today and, if you want to give any house a modern air, try to make the windows seem important. One way is to frame them in a group by covering the wall and leaving



the glass exposed. A comparison of these two sketches shows that this may be done even though the windows are unevenly spaced. The cream colored walls, glass curtains and window shades are the same in both and the same two-toned green rug and the same lamp and pictures are used. The couch and cushions are also the same, but the covers are new.

An inexpensive chair with grey-green ground and a flower pattern is used for draperies and to trim the couch cover of heavier grey-green cotton material which is also used for the cushions. The glass curtains are hung on rods suspended from the picture moulding with picture wire and beads. The side drapes are unlined but the valance is made over buckram. Both are tacked to pine strips and are hung with picture hooks. One end of the book shelves is closed in to make a head for the couch. The outside is painted grey-green and the inside dark green. The parchment lamp shade has green windings.
