MAY DEVOTIONS

May, the liveliest month in all the year, commences on next Saturday, May Day. From early childhood Catholics have paid special tribute to the Mother of God during this month, which Holy Mother Church has dedicated to Our Lady. How eagerly, as children, we looked forward to May! How we loved to make a shrine in honor of Our Lady! How we searched for flowers worn of her shrine! How devoutly we prayed to Our Lady during May! May Altars are not a childish fancy but an expression of our love for Our Blessed Lady. We never grow too old to be a child

of Mary for, as we grow older we have more need of her protection than we did as children. We may not have a May Altar but we can still have an altar in our heart for Mary.

Blessed Louis Marie Grignon de Montfort tells us that our devotion to Mary must be intelligent, tender, holy, constant and disinterested. He tells us that "True devotion to Mary is interior; that is to say, it comes from the spirit and the heart. It is tender, that is to say, full of confidence in her, like a child's confidence in his loving mother. It is a word in all its parts of body and mind the soul's ordinary refuge is in Mary, without fearing to displease Jesus. True devotion to Our Lady is holy, that is to say, it leads the soul to avoid sin and to imitate in the Blessed Virgin particularly her profound humility, her lively faith, her blind obedience, her continual prayer, her universal sympathy, her divine purity, her ardent charity, her heroic patience, her angelic sweetness and her divine wisdom. These are the ten principal virtues of the most Holy Virgin. True devotion to Our Lady is constant. It conforms the soul to God and makes it courageous in opposing the world. A person truly devoted to Our Lady is neither changeable, irritable, suspicious or timid. True devotion to Our Lady is disinterested; that is to say, it inspires the soul not to seek itself but God only and God in His Holy Mother. A true devotee does not love Mary precisely because she does him good or because he hopes in her but because she is so worthy of love."

We of the United States pay special tribute to Mary under the title of Our Lady of the Immaculate Conception; the Mexicans love Our Lady of Guadalupe and the French people pay special honor to Our Lady of Lourdes. Many churches throughout the world honor Mary by a series of prayers known as a Novena and we have novenas to Our Lady of Good Counsel, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, Our Lady of Sorrows and Our Lady of the Miraculous Medal. Throughout the year Holy Mother Church honors Mary by a special Mass on her various Feast Days. Mary has many titles and many forms of devotion. If we glance at the Litany of Our Lady, we will find that in the Litany alone we ask her intercession under forty or more different titles. Thus we may choose a special devotion in honor of Mary for every day during her month.

During the month of May, if we wish to honor Our Lady, "We will do all our acts to Mary, with Mary, in Mary, and for Mary so that we may do them all the more perfectly by Jesus, with Jesus, in Jesus and for Jesus."

May Devotions will be held every evening during May in St. Mary's Church. They will commence at 7:30 and will consist of prayers in honor of Our Lady, a short discourse on the life of Our Lady, and Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

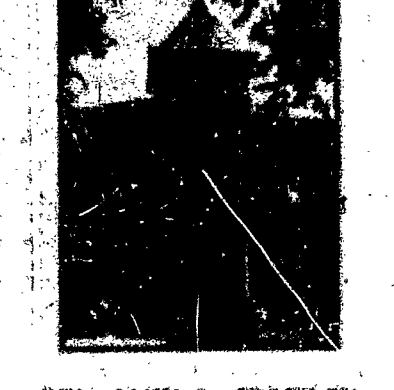

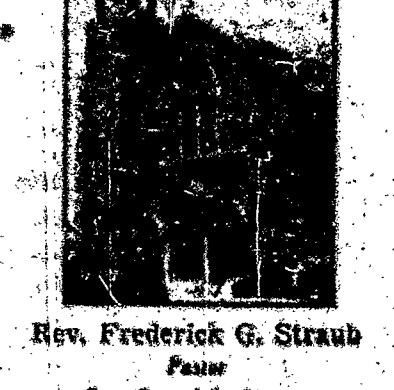
