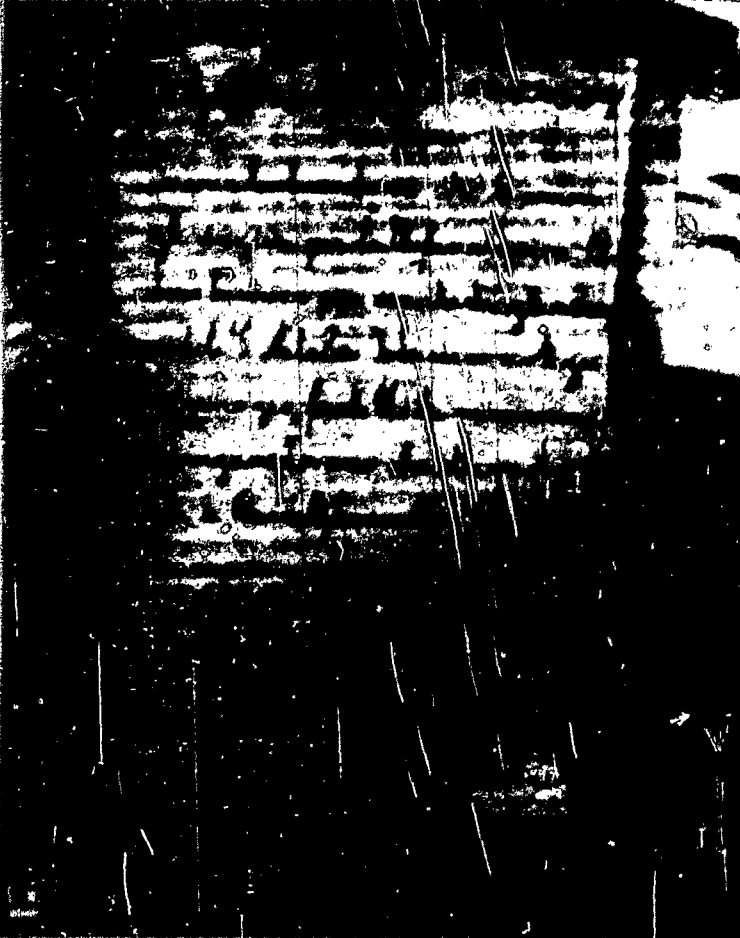
### Farm Population

### CHAPLAIN, IN SECOND WAR, WINS SECOND DECORATION

MILWAUKEE.—The Rev. August F. Gearhard, a priest of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee, who is now senior Catholic chaplain with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel with the U. S. Air Force in the southwest Pacific, has been awarded the silver star decoration for gallantry in action, according to news received here by his mother, Mrs. Theresa Gearhard. Father Gearhard won the Distinguished Service Cross in World War I, while serving as Chaplain with the 328th Infantry, 82nd Division.

Mexico City.—The Most Rev. Luis M. Martinez, Archbishop of Mexico, has appointed eight architects to the Archdiocesan Commission on Religious Art which is headed by the Rev. Dr. Luis F. Garibay. The Commission, which was established for the purpose of watching over and preserving religious art as it exists in the capital against well-meaning but not always desirable intrusions, is charged with studying plans for church edifices with a view to good taste and efficiency, and coordinating its activities with those of the civil authorities involved.

Don't you think that is a grand record? It makes one feel proud that he is a part of this great organization.

The missionaries are deserving of all the prayers we can say and all the sacrifices that we can make for them. I know all of you will want to make this Novena of Thanksgiving for the mission and for your own spiritual and temporal welfare. A Novena of Masses will be offered at the Altar of the Infant Jesus in the chapel of the National Office for the intentions of the Novena and the welfare of those participating in it.

The returns for the Chapel Drive have been coming in very favorably. I can see that you boys and girls sacrificed a great deal for the missions during Lent. God will bless you for what you have done and the priests and sisters and people in these mission countries will always remember you in their prayers.
