### Impressive Holy Week Rites

**OWEGO**—Holy Week Services were well attended by the parishioners of St. Patrick's. Holy Communion was distributed at 8:30, 7 o'clock and during the High Mass on Holy Thursday and there were large crowds attending at all three hours.

Following the 8 o'clock Mass the procession of the Blessed Sacrament was held with the altar boys and school children taking part. Four little girls all in white, in large white robes on their heads, carried the Hosts on their heads and with rose petals walked immediately in front of the income bearers and scattered the Hosts before the Blessed Sacrament.

When the procession had wound its way through the church it ended at the altar of the Blessed Virgin where the new Repository for the Blessed Sacrament had been placed and which had been purchased by the members of the Rosary Society. Here before the new gold repository hundreds of parishioners knelt throughout the

day in adoration. The Holy Hour was held in the evening concluding at 7:30 o'clock.

On Good Friday evening following the Stations of the Cross an inspiring sermon on The Stations was delivered by the Rev. Michael L. Hynes, Pastor of the Church.

Both the 8 o'clock and the 10 o'clock Masses on Easter Sunday were attended by a large number of the parishioners, the larger number attending the Early Mass in order to receive Holy Communion. Special prayers were offered during the week for the boys who are in the service and for a just and lasting peace.

**GENEVA**—Lieutenant August Cervini of the United States Naval Training Station at Sampson, N. Y., guest speaker at the annual Easter breakfast of the St. Stephen's Club, Sunday morning stressed the value of faith particularly to the service men who are on duty in foreign lands, far from family and friends. The comfort of their religion to these men cannot be over emphasized, he pointed out.

Lieutenant Cervini spoke before the group of about forty club members at breakfast at the Hotel Seneca following attendance at the club at the 10 o'clock Mass at St. Stephen's Church where they received Holy Communion in a body.
