WASHINGTON.—The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Patrick J. McCormick, Acting Rector of the Catholic University of America since the death of Bishop Joseph M. Corrigan on June 9, 1942, was advised on Apr. 28 of his appointment by His Holiness Pope Pius XII as Rector of the institution.

Word of the appointment was conveyed to Monsignor McCormick by His Excellency the Most Rev. Amleto Giovanni Cicognani, Apostolic Delegate to the United States. The appointment is for a period of five years.

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Community-War Chest Campaign Enlists Full Support of Catholics

War Needs Call For Generous Backing Of 1943 Campaign

Rochester Catholics will share in the hard task of filling the Community and War Chest next week, both as solicitors and as contributors, and Catholic agencies will share in the funds distributed to local and national agencies.

Ability and capacity for leadership, rather than religious faith, is the test of campaign generalship; and Rochester Catholics may well take pride in the fact that the general campaign chairman, Bernard E. Finucane; Arthur P. Kelly, chairman of the Utility Division; Harry B. Crowley, chairman of the Speakers' Division, and William T. Nolan, secretary of the Public Division, are contributing vitally to the pre-campaign organization work for the Chest, and will carry a heavy portion of the canvassing responsibility May 10 to 17.

St. Ann's Home for the Aged; St. Joseph's Villa, the new children's home in Dewey Avenue; St. Mary's Hospital; The Rochester Catholic Charities; Columbus Youth Association; Charles Settlement House; St. Elizabeth Guild House and the Genesee Institute all will share in the Community and War Chest budget this year. NCCS Service.

The National Catholic Community Service is one of the six national agencies that have joined forces to sponsor the USO, which will receive the largest single appropriation from the Community and War Chest this year. The NCCS makes available special services, through the USO, to Catholic men in the armed forces all over the United States, its island possessions, and in bases in Alaska and the Canal Zone.

In addition, local representatives of the NCCS are co-operating in the supervision of Rochester's own USO Center in Franklin Square, regarded as one of the best Centers in the country. (There are over 1,300 USO Centers now in operation, serving the recreational, welfare, and spiritual needs of soldiers, sailors, and marines of all faiths.) Mrs. Robert C. Hartmann has recently been named a member of the USO staff here representing the National Catholic Community Service.

The USO has become, deservedly, one of the most popular organizations seeking funds on a national basis. It has the full approval of the Army and Navy Departments, which two years ago asked the National Catholic Community Service, and five other national organizations concerned with the welfare of young people.

Students of St. Andrew's Seminary will fill the minor offices and the Cathedral Men's Choir will be directed by Raymond J. Hasenquer.

In announcing the Solemn Services for Sunday, Father Lambert stated: "The importance of the Community Chest cannot be over-

emphasized during these years of strife.

Urges United Effort

"The funds collected by the Chest go for the defense of both the war front and the home front. The 21 National and International war relief funds affect the war front directly and need the united effort of all patriotic Americans for their success at home and abroad.

"The maintenance of the local agencies for the protection of the health and for the welfare of our citizens—young and old, is a very essential need for the morale of our people. War always calls for sacrifices and there is no sacrifice more urgently needed than that necessary to carry on the activities of the War and Community Chest Agencies. The citizens of Rochester can be counted on to meet the challenge even at a sacrifice."
