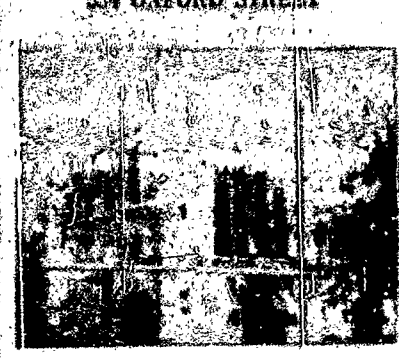

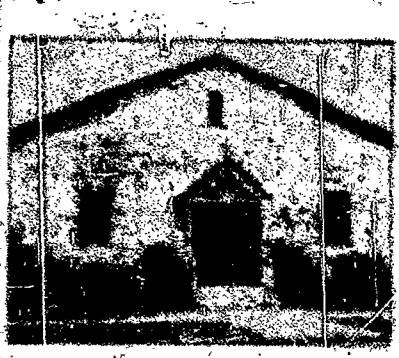

MAIN DINNERS DISHES WITH LEFTOVER VALUE FOR LUNCHBOX MEALS

Increase recipes when necessary to insure sufficient quantity of leftovers for a lunchbox menu. Skip a day before using leftover portions in lunchbox and keep in refrigerator.

Use extra flavoring on meat loaves when used for sandwiches. Where appropriate add catsup, chili sauce, grated horseradish, sliced cucumber pickle, chopped mustard pickle, sliced stuffed olives, chopped cabbage, carrot or celery. Sliced radishes and green onion or chives are delicious.

A variety of breads such as whole wheat, cracked wheat, soya flour, rye and oatmeal loaves are pleasing in giving variety to the lunch and added food value.

SAUSAGE MEAT LOAF

1 lb. bulk pork sausage, 1/2 c. to- matoes (fresh or canned), 1/2 c. milk (a little more may be added), 3 shredded wheat biscuits or 3 c. bread crumbs, 1 egg, beaten.

1.—Crumble shr. wheat bisc. and add with other ingredients to meat and mix well.

2.—Fill loaf bread pan with mix- ture and press down.

3.—Bake 1 hr. in 350° F. oven (6 large or 8 small servings)

GRAVY FOR SAUSAGE LOAF

1.—Pour oil fat from loaf pan; measure 1 tbsp. into frying pan; add 1 c. milk and 1 c. water.

2.—Bring to boiling point and thicken with 3 tbsp. flour stirred to smooth paste with a little cold water. Simmer 5 min.

3.—Season to taste with salt.
