Courage Shown While Adrift 83 Days On Raft Wins Awards

NEW YORK (AP) — Steamship East D. East, Captain U. E. Haver,

gunner, was recruited here with the two Dutch steamers with whom he was adrift for 83 days on a life raft in the South Atlantic after their merchant ship had been torpedoed. The three were awarded medals by the National Maritime Union for "unparalleled courage and stamina" at a Labor-for-Victory rally in Yankee Stadium.

Seaman East, of South Shore, Mass., credited the rescue of himself and his companions to an answer from God of the unceasing prayers they offered throughout their uncharted 2,000-mile voyage at sea. Seaman East has visited war plants and ship yards on a morale-building tour sponsored by the Navy Department.

FR. JAMES DROUGHT, MARYKNOLL'S VICAR GENERAL, SUCCEUMS

MARYKNOLL, N. Y. — The Very Rev. James Matthew Drought, Vicar General of Maryknoll, died in New York City on Saturday afternoon from a heart attack, while he was talking with friends. Father Drought was 46 years old.

With Bishop Francis X. Ford, of Brooklyn, he pioneered the opening of the Maryknoll Mission Station, while in Kaying he wrote a grammar of Hakka, a dialect of the Chinese language. In 1926, he was transferred to the Philippine Islands for special work. He was active in the field of education. He administered hospitals for Catholic students studying at Philippine universities.

In 1928, Father Drought returned to America to attend the first General Chapter of the Society to be held the following year. He came to the United States by way of Russia, traveling across that country and studying Russian life. At the General Chapter he was elected Third Councillor. In 1934, he was appointed Vicar General and Treasurer of the Society. At the Hong Kong Chapter, in 1936, he was elected Vicar General and responsible to the position of Treasurer.

Returning from Hong Kong, his plane crashed over Crete and he suffered a fractured spine. Though he was back in active duty within a year, the accident left a permanent mark on his health.

WIFE OF CHINESE DIPLOMAT FOLLOWS THEIR CHILDREN INTO CATHOLIC FAITH

CHICAGO — Mrs. T. P. Sui, wife of Dr. Sui, official Delegate of Justice of the Chinese Government, was baptized after the 9 o'clock Mass here in St. Thorese's Chinese Catholic Mission by the pastor, the Rev. John T. S. Mao.

Three and one-half years ago Father Mao baptized Dr. and Mrs. Sui's two older children, Moyra, then 13, and Barbara, 12. In 1942, he also baptized the couple's three younger children in New York: Victoria 7, Matthew 10 and Paul 8. For the ceremony today Moyra came from Chestnut Hill Academy, Philadelphia, and Matthew from Norwood Academy, Philadelphia. Father Mao became acquainted with Dr. and Mrs. Sui in Washington about five years ago.

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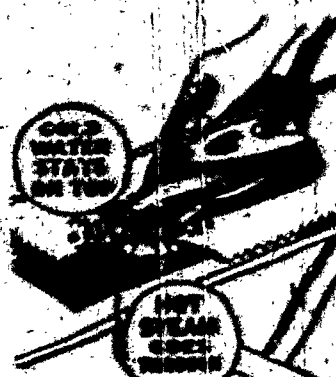
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
