URGES CATHOLIC ACTION

AUBURN—The Catholic Action League of St. Alphonsus Church held their April Supper Meeting on Wednesday evening in the Parish House in East Geneva Street. Miss Athanasia Reid, president, presided at the affair which was attended by over 60 members and guests. Rev. Frederick G. Straub, pastor, in the new spiritual director of the league, presiding over Rev. John Mavrlinger, his former assistant, who was recently transferred to St. Ann's Parish, Hornell. Also attending the meeting were Rev. Richard Stanton of Elmira, a former assistant to Father Straub, Rev. Gerard Amann and Rev. Gerard Geseff.

Officers were elected as follows for the year 1943-44: President, Mrs. Frank Hal; Vice-President, Mrs. Cyril Harold; Secretary, Miss Alice Shaw; Treasurer, Miss Caroline Casper.

Miss Reid, the retiring president, gave an appropriate Catholic Action talk and urged the members to read and study the book, "In the Vineyard Essays on Catholic Action," saying that the book's teaching is in so well with the Catholic Action League. These books were gifts from the former moderator, Father Mavrlinger. Miss Reid said in part: "In keeping with my remarks from the last meeting that we, the lay people, would have to assume more spiritual responsibility, I have gathered together a few spiritual thoughts for tonight."

"In our Study Club in studying and discussing the pamphlet on 'Our Parish' we took particular note of the part pointing out to us that Confirmation is the Sacrament of Catholic Action and I am sure that all of you did the same. By Baptism, the Christian becomes a member of Christ and thereby already receives a small share in the priesthood of Christ. This priestly power conferred by Baptism is principally a passive one. It gives us title to the reception of the other Sacraments. Baptism makes us children of God. We share the life of Christ and so must show it by being Christ-like. Obedience as children imitates the great virtue of the Christ-like."

"By Confirmation we become adult, militant Christians. The Holy Ghost with his sevenfold gifts sets us on fire so that we in turn may bring light and warmth to our fellowmen. Confirmation makes us grown-up children of God—adults, and so like unto the grown-up Christ whose great prerogatives and virtues were to praise His Father by His own life and to lead others to His Father to praise Him by their life. (This is real Catholic Action.)"

"Then, to be and act as confirmed grown-up other Christs—not merely baptized children—but grown up adults doing the job of praising the Father and leading others to Him in a prayerful, grown-up, business-like way. Really out to get our acquaintances, those in our own environment. But in fact, the whole world is the scene of our acting."

"So in summarizing: 'Christ the Child was obedient. Christ the Adult was priestly. He pleased God the Father. He loved His mother and led others to please the Father by their lives. We, Christian children in Baptism, are obedient and we, Christ-like adults in Confirmation are priestly which leads to God the Father."

"To carry out the program: (1) Learn to appreciate Mass for it is the only way to please God, the Father in a perfect manner, and (2) Catholic Action in Daily Life, teaching by giving good example of a True Catholic."

President Reid in behalf of the League thanked Mrs. Frank Hal, chairman of her committee for the arrangements for the April meeting. Assisting Mrs. Hal were Helen Brogan, Winifred Ryan, Alice Shaw, Margaret Hawelka, Anna Sweeney, Genevieve Vall, Mrs. Raymond Conley and Catherine Ryan.

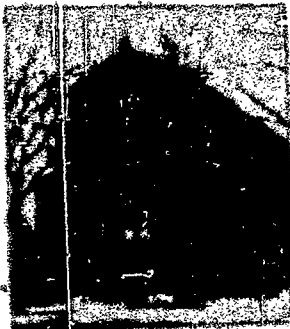

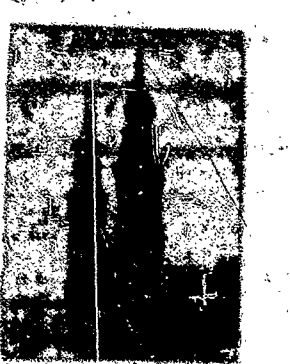
