MARY'S DAY

Mary's Day is observed on the second Saturday of May, the day before Mother's Day and this year it falls on Saturday, May 8. The May Day movement commenced fifteen years ago and received the blessing of His Holiness Pope Pius XI as well as that of the present Holy Father and many of our bishops. The object of the day is to honor Mary as the mother of mankind.

All lovers of Mary are asked to contribute every Saturday to Mary, their mother, and once a year on the Saturday before Mother's Day to unite through public celebration and nation-wide observance in honoring Our Blessed Lady. The movement also aims to encourage children to form, early in life, a real true love for the Mother of God. Mary's children on her day are urged to assist at the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and to re-honor it, wear the Miraculous Scapular, Holy Communion in her Medal visibly on that day and to give some alms in Mary's Name.

A nation-wide committee of women sponsoring the day have compiled a list of prayers for May that Mary's clients may ask her intercession under the title of Our Lady, Queen of Peace. The leaflet is entitled "Mobilize for Mary" and is printed here so that you too may join Mary's Army. If you wish:

"To mobilize means to prepare for war. The world is mobilizing for death and destruction. The Blessed Mother is calling to every Catholic to mobilize under her generalship for Life and Peace. The Saviour of the world is still the Saviour. He will refuse His Mother nothing. The forces of evil can be overcome through Mary's intercession. Pvt. Samuel J. DiPasquale, a graduate of St. Lucy's School was wounded in action in the right arm. The last information received about his injury, was a letter of Apr. 9, stating that he "is in the hospital but coming along fine."

Private DiPasquale, 21, enlisted in September, 1941, and is one of two brothers in the service. Corporal Anthony J. Mitchell, Field; Private Joseph J. and Private Michael, 28, of Camp Robinson, Ariz. and Private James, 21, Westover Field, Mass.

At St. Lucy's he was a member of the basketball team and served as an altar boy for 3 years. In baseball, Private DiPasquale won a medal in city honors. Lucy DiPasquale, his sister, and Prefect of the Sodality at St. Lucy's, stated that her brother's injury to his right arm makes him fear that he will not be able to use it again to throw a fast ball.
