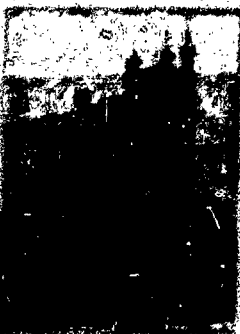

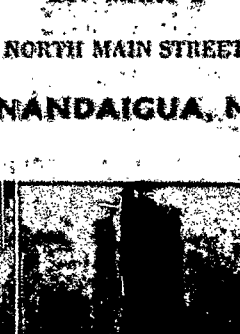

New Monsignor Served In Army, Navy, Marines

WEST POINT, N. Y.—(UPI)—The Rev. George A. Murdock, rector of Most Holy Trinity Chapel of the U. S. Military Academy, here, who has been elevated to the rank of Papal Chamberlain with the title of Very Reverend Monsignor, has served as a chaplain in the Navy and Marine Corps, as well as for the cadets and Army Personnel here.

(The West Point pastor, on the invitation of His Excellency, Bishop Kearney, preached the sermon at a Pontifical Mass in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Rochester, on July 4, 1941.)

Monsignor Murdock was ordained on June 2, 1917, and after a brief period of parish work, was assigned to Highland Falls, N. Y., with duty at the Military Academy during World War I. In 1921 he was commissioned a chaplain in the Navy and served at the Great Lakes Training Station and aboard the U. S. S. McVilvie and the U. S. S. Arcostook. While stationed with the Naval Air Squadrons at North Island, Calif., he went through training and qualified as a pilot in 1923.

With the Marine Corps, he served at the Quantico, Va., base and in 1927 in Nicaragua during the revolution there. He was aboard the U. S. S. Lexington, now sunk, when the ship made its maiden cruise to Honolulu in 1928. He resigned from the Navy in 1929 and served at All Saints' Church, New York City, from 1930 to 1932, when he was appointed rector of the chapel here.

Among the priests also named Papal Chamberlains with the title Very Reverend Monsignor who are known in the Rochester diocese are the Rev. John J. McCarthy, Executive Secretary of the Legion of Decency, and the Rev. John J. Scully, Diocesan Director of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith.
