Chaplain's Needs Cited Requests in the Chaplains' Aid campaign which is being conducted to supply direct help and the other needed articles for Catholic chaplains in the armed forces were given last Thursday evening by Chaplain John V. Loughlin, lieutenant senior grade, U. S. Navy, who returned to Rochester for the first time since his enlistment in May, 1942.

Father Loughlin at the time of his enlistment was Librarian of St. Bernard's Seminary and Chaplain of Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus.

The Chaplains' Aid Association through which the funds are administered, Chaplain Loughlin said, "makes sure that every boy in the service, wherever from, will be well taken care of."

He congratulated the knights on their campaign to date and assured them that this was the only way to assure the Chaplains everywhere of getting the articles they so sorely need.

Announcement was made that the campaign has been extended to May 27 when the New York State Council's convention opens in Albany. At that time the funds

will be turned over to His Excellency, Bishop Kearney. State Chaplain in the form of a testimonial.

Honor Mary As Mother Of God, First Friday Club Members Told

"Everyone who accepts the doctrine of the Incarnation should give honor to Mary of Nazareth," the Rev. Dr. Edward J. Byrne of St. Bernard's Seminary faculty told more than 60 members of the First Friday Luncheon Club at its session last Friday at Hotel Sagamore.

Speaking on the "Saint of the Month," Dr. Byrne said that it was only fitting that in the month devoted to the Blessed Mother, honor should be paid to Her who is the Mother of God.

Those who have a proper realization of the nature and personality of God have the key to an understanding of the doctrine of the Incarnation, the speaker said. He pointed out that this understanding is not necessarily confined to those fortunate enough to have higher studies in theology, but through God's grace, deficiencies are made up, and many have been brought to a strong realization of the doctrine.

The Rev. Raymond C. Heisch, moderator, presided and guests included the Rev. Francis J. Heenan, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church and the Rev. William J. Schifferl, assistant pastor of Holy Redeemer Church.

Dr. Frank Mastaglio was chairman for the May meeting.
