

### Gives \$50,000 Tract Near Crippled Children's Home

CLEVELAND.—Donation of a 14-acre tract, containing a two-story 12-room dwelling, owned by William F. Delaney, to the Director of Cleveland, has been announced here by the Most Rev. Edward J. Hoban, Coadjutor Bishop of Cleveland.

The suburban property adjacent to the diocesan institution of Holy Mary Home for Crippled Children and will be used as an annex to the home. The property has an estimated value of \$50,000. The Sisters of the Holy Humility of Mary are in charge of the home, where many cases of seriously crippled youngsters have occurred in the last 20 years.


