VATICAN CITY, May 1.—A call for immediate action to prevent the still growing population and increasing crime from becoming uncontrollable, has been issued by Cardinal Giacomo D'Adda, Vicar of the Pope, and Secretary General of the Pontifical Council for Social Justice.

The Pope issued the statement at the end of a two-day conference of the Pontifical Council for Social Justice, the Pontifical Commission for the Protection of Children and the Protection of the Family, and the Pontifical Commission for the Protection of the Poor.
