NEWARK, O. — Honoring the memory of Eugene John Lincoln Doney, Catholic naval officer hero of the South Pacific warfare, an escort vessel has been designated as the U. S. E. Doney and the officer's parents have been invited to attend the commissioning ceremonies at the Philadelphia Navy Yard on June 7.

Urges Protection Of Civilians From Bombs

VATICAN CITY (AP)—A call for immediate action to protect civilian populations and historic cities from bombardment has been issued by Giuseppe de Liguoro and Emilio Napolitano, Rome secular papers.

The papers urged the example of the earlier acceptance by General Franco and Chiang Kai-Shek of the so-called safety zone proposed by the Neutral Association, thus saving countless thousands of civilian lives. The papers point out that General Franco renounced neutral zones in Madrid and in Las Armas, and quote General Chiang Kai-Shek as saying the acceptance of the suggestion in Shanghai and Hankow saved the lives of 200,000 Chinese civilians.

The papers urge immediate limitations in this direction by the International Red Cross, the League of Nations and other agencies to save civilian populations, especially in England, France, Germany and Italy.

STUDENTS CONCLUDE YEAR OF PRAYER FOR SERVICEMEN

DETROIT—Services in Sacred Heart Church at Marygrove College today concluded a year of prayer for relatives and friends of the armed services. Names of those men in service have been noted during the year on a "Book of Grace" near the entrance to the chapel as one of the projects of the Sodality.

On the "Book of Grace" approximately 750 names appear under the insignia of the United States Army, 360 under that of the army air force, 480 under Navy insignia, and 150 under that of the Marines. The names of 37 chaplains are listed as relatives of Marygrove students.
