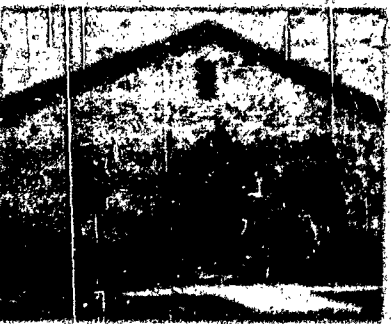

OPA Combats Black Market

Fast developing a list of nearly 80 per cent of the foodstuffs carried in the family marketbasket, to be placed under price control by June 1, OPA on Monday announced ceiling prices on beef, veal, lamb and mutton for this area, according to Joseph D. Paterson, Rochester district director.

Part of a nation-wide effort to hold down cost of living commodities and to combat activities of black market operators, these new meat prices represent a reduction of one to three cents per pound from retail ceilings originally scheduled to take effect Apr. 15.

With this week's announcement virtually all meats are now covered by top prices any retailer may charge his customers. "Dollars and cents ceilings were placed on pork and pork products Apr. 1 and ceilings were also established for poultry on Apr. 22. Top prices on all kinds of soap go into effect May 24. All other commodities not recently priced remain under ceilings established March, 1942. By June 1 most food prices will be rolled back about 10 per cent in an additional effort to curb inflation.

Here are sample ceiling prices in effect Monday for Grade A meats sold in stores doing under \$250,000 a year, prices in stores over \$250,000 operate under slightly lower ceilings due to greater volume: porterhouse steak 61, sir-

loin 46, round steak 47, beef rib roast 77, hamburger 22, veal cutlets 52, lamb rib chops 50, lamb leg chops 50, lamb loin chops 50, lamb leg roast 43 and lamb steaks 50 cents per pound.

"This week's action is a protection to the housewife and to the great majority of retail merchants alike, who, operating under difficult wartime conditions, are conforming to government price controls to insure stabilization," Mr. Paterson said.

Price panels, now being appointed by the 10 war price and rationing boards in the Rochester district will play a major role in the administration of these ceilings and every housewife can now give her full support to "holding the line."
