Denies State Aid For Child Care In Religious Schools

ALBANY (NC)—Attorney General Nathan F. Goldstein of New York, has drawn up an opinion which holds there is no prohibition against the granting of funds for care of children of war workers to any organization, public or private, provided the child care project "is not conducted or maintained in the same structure, building or office as any school or institution of learning wholly or in part under the control or direction of any religious institution."

The Attorney General's opinion was addressed to the New York State War Council here, and recited that he had received a number of inquiries from various denominational groups who asked whether public funds can be granted for a child care project operated in a denominational school, such as a parochial school or a Talmud Torah.

Mr. Goldstein stated it was his opinion "that the maintenance of a child care project in a parochial, Talmud Torah or religious school building, even though outside school hours, would be in direct violation" of the State Constitution.

He added that he also had been asked whether the funds can be granted for a project to be operated by a Board of Education, Department of Social Welfare or a private social agency in a parish house, Y. M. C. A., K. of C. or Y. M. H. A. building. He stated:

"The mere fact that a building is owned by a religious corporation does not, in my opinion, prevent its use by public agencies for non-educational projects. The same would be true in respect to assistance to projects conducted by non-secular, private agencies which carry out a public purpose. I am predicating my opinion on the fact that the purpose of the child care program . . . is to provide care and not instruction and the program is not an educational one."

Msgr. William F. Morgan, Chancellor of the Diocese and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George V. Burns, Director of the Mass, the Rev. Thomas J. O'Hern, brother of Bishop O'Hern's, homilist; the Rev. Edward M. Lyons, Master of Ceremonies, the Rev. Lawrence M. Casey, Assistant Master, the Rev. James G. McAuley.

The Mass will be sung in the choir of St. Andrew's Seminary under the direction of the Rev. Benedict A. Shanahan.

Decency Legion Condemns 'Lady of Burlesque' Film

The Legion of Decency has placed the motion picture "Lady of Burlesque," produced by Hunt Stromberg and released through United Artists, in the condemned classification.

Such action rates a "C" rating for this film, and no member of the Legion of Decency can in conscience witness this picture.

Catholics in Rochester should take note that the picture will be shown at Lee's Rochester, beginning Thursday, May 25 and continuing through the week.

The Rev. John S. Randall, Diocesan Director of the Legion of Decency stated that an effort has been made to have this picture withdrawn. The local management informed him that the officials of Lee's Corporation told him that despite its condemnation, that picture would be shown in Rochester.

Father Randall said: "Catholics should take particular note of the fact that any C picture which has played in the city in recent months has been shown at Lee's Rochester. Those who take the pledge of the Legion of Decency promise to stay away from pieces of amusements which show pictures that can be so objectionable."

The Legion has given the following reason for listing the "Lady of Burlesque" as a "C" picture: "The film contains double meaning, lewd, salacious, lascivious and indecent costumes and situations, and indecent content, presented against a background of a serious form of entertainment."

K. of C. Open Drive For Chaplains' Aid
