

Lift Woolen Scapular Requirement

NEW YORK.—For the duration of the war the Brown Scapulars of Our Lady of Mount Carmel need not be made of woolen cloth. It was announced here today upon receipt of a ruling from Vatican City. The ruling was given in answer to a request made by the Most Rev. Hillary M. Dowd, Prior General of the Order of Car-

melites, because of difficulty in getting all-woolen materials. The announcement was made by the Very Rev. Gabriel N. Faust, American Assistant General of the Carmelites and Religious Director of the Scapular Mission, which has supplied well over a half-million Brown Scapulars to American servicemen. Father

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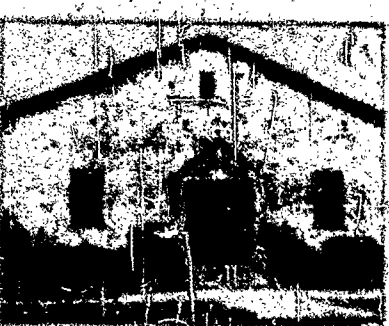

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Community Action Pamphlet Issued By N.C.W.C. Groups

WASHINGTON.— Under the joint sponsorship of the Department of Education National Catholic Welfare Conference, and the National Council of Catholic Women, a 24-page pamphlet titled "We Catholics and Our Community" has just been issued. The pamphlet, it was announced, offers concrete suggestions to lay groups for community activity and is complete with references and discussion outlines.
