

Lift Woolen Scapular Requirement

NEW YORK.—For the duration of the war the Brown Scapulars of Our Lady of Mount Carmel need not be made of woolen cloth. It was announced here today upon receipt of a ruling from Vatican City. The ruling was given in answer to a request made by the Most Rev. Hillary M. Dowd, Prior General of the Order of Car-

melites, because of difficulty in getting all-woolen materials. The announcement was made by the Very Rev. Gabriel N. Faustback, American Assistant General of the Carmelites and Religious Director of the Scapular Shrine, which has supplied well over a half-million Brown Scapulars to American servicemen. Father

Faustback said that many an invalid material for Brown Scapulars, since felt does not conform to other Scapular decrees demanding a woven cloth.
