Systematic Attacks On Church Draw Ire Of Catholic Editors

TOLEDO, O.—Members of the Catholic Press Association, assembled in their Thirty-third annual convention, directed attention to signs of a systematic and implacable campaign against the Catholic Church both here and abroad.

After pledging full support of "unwavering loyalty to the President of the United States, the Association condemned all attacks upon religion and the Church "at this critical moment when the collaboration of all moral and spiritual forces is imperatively necessary." It pointed to the "difficulties being put in the way of Pope Pius XII's unselfish efforts to bring relief to war sufferers and the anti-religious propaganda of obscure origin increasing so alarmingly in Europe."

Deplore Magazine Attack In another resolution the Press Association expressed "regret at what seems to be a systematic and sustained attack upon the Catholic Church on the part of certain magazines in America."

Pledging that the Catholic Press would continue "to promote unity of feeling and of effort amongst the people of this country," it demanded in return "that all organs of opinion, both secular and religious, shall respect the sincerity of our efforts to assist the Government and nation in the present emergency. First American-Made Altar Missal Now In Second Edition

NEW YORK.—The first American edition of the altar-size Missal Romanum, ecclesiastically authorized, has been exhausted within five months of date of publication. The printing of a second edition has been completed and is ready for distribution.

From the time of the first printed edition of the Missale Romanum at Milan, Italy, in 1474 up to the present, this highly complicated and technical book had been produced in Europe. Today, with European imports eliminated by the war, the American-made Missal is in use in parish churches, chapels and convents in every section of the United States and has found its way into Canada, Alaska, England and Ireland, Mexico and South America. It was edited and produced from setting of type in finished volume by Benziger Brothers, Inc., of New York.

Benedictine In Army

ATCHISON, Kan.—The Rev. Philip O'Connor, O.S.B., has been commissioned in the Army and has reported at the Chaplain Training School at Harvard University. He is the seventh member of St. Benedict's Abbey, here, to enter the armed forces as a chaplain.

Paimanet, India.—Crowds of Hindus and Moslems lined the streets of this town when the first Eucharistic procession in its history was held by the Catholics of the district.

Theater Mgr. Withdraws Legion-Condemned Film

The film "Lady of Burlesque," condemned by the Legion of Decency, and shown at the Keeney Theatre in Elmira, was withdrawn before the scheduled time of termination.

Approached by a member of the Catholic clergy, the manager of the Keeney Theatre offered to withdraw the picture as soon as another could be sent from Buffalo to replace it. Unfortunately the earliest date possible was Wednesday, and the picture was withdrawn then instead of Thursday. However the newspaper advertising was immediately reduced to the smallest possible space—a one-column, half-inch statement of title and period of run.

Announcements had been made in three Elmira Catholic churches urging Catholics to remain away from the showing, and a front-page article in the CATHOLIC COURIER performed the same office. However, the manager pointed out that not a single Catholic organization or individual had approached him, last week when the

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picture was advertised, and when another movie might have been obtained in time to prevent any showing at all.
