Dictators Crack Smugness K. of C. Leader Tells 300 At Corning Ceremony

CORNING.—Thomas J. McDonnell, principal of the Kensington High School, Buffalo, was the guest speaker at the Communion Breakfast, held in connection with the exemplification of the Third Degree, Sunday, May 13, by the Knights of Columbus of Corning and vicinity. Mr. McDonnell, district deputy of the 58th District, who was introduced by James P. Hallahan, past grand knight of the Corning Council, declared that the dictators have done us a marvelous service in reminding us of the true values of life.

"We have been shaken out of our smugness and warned of a great peril," said the speaker, "and in that warning is our salvation. Our feverish bustling world, self satisfied and yet malcontent, under the mask of riotous living, had left us dead at heart. To Meet Challenge

"There must be a return to religion if we hope to meet the challenge to democracy successfully because Christian principles and democratic principles coincide.

"Today the faith in Christianity is being attacked and attacked successfully. Thirty years ago Europe was nominally Christian. It is no longer so. As in the days before Constantine, Christianity is now in the minority in Europe.

"Gladstone's statement of 70 years ago has become a shattering truth: 'I am convinced that the welfare of mankind does not now depend on the state and the world of politics. The real battle is being fought in the world of thought, while a deadly attack is made with great tenacity of purpose and over a wide field upon the greatest gift of mankind—the belief in God and the Gospel of Christ.'"

Communion Mass

The day's program opened with a parade from the K. of C. Home to St. Mary's Church, where Communion was received at the 8:30 A. M. Mass. The procession, in which nearly 300 took part, was headed by St. Patrick's Cadets Drum and Bugle Corps and the Fourth Degree Assembly of the local council. From the church the Knights marched to the Baron Steuben Hotel, where the breakfast was served.

At 1 P. M. candidates assembled in the American Legion Rooms and were escorted to the K. of C. Home. Prior to the degree work a choral group, under the direction of Robert Geary of Hornell, sang several selections accompanied by Lawrence Regan of Painted Post.
