MEMORIAL DAY SERVICES

A colorful memorial service for the men in the armed forces will be held at St. Anthony's Church on Sunday, May 30, at 7 p. m.

The procession of children will be led by the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Cubs of the Parish, carrying flags. The school children, dressed in white, will represent Hall Marys, while the altar boys in red cassocks will be the Our Fathers. Each child will carry a lighted red vigil light.

As they approach the shrine of the Immaculate Conception, where the honor rolls of the parish are displayed, six names of service men will be read out, and the children will recite the particular prayer they represent.

After the living rosary, two Boy Scouts will carry lighted gold vigil lights to the shrine, in memory of the two boys from St. Anthony's who died in the service of their country, Lt. Harold King, and Pfc. Theodore Pinelli.

Nine girls dressed in red, white, and blue will bear flowers to be placed on the altar. When all the children have assembled before the main altar, the hymn to Our Lady of Victory will be sung, followed by solemn benediction, and recitation of the prayers of peace.

The pledge of allegiance will be made, and the National Anthem sung. Following "Taps," the recessional will be "Holy God."

Calls Finding Foster Homes Vital War Work

HARTFORD, Conn.—The importance of finding proper foster homes during the war period for infants and pre-school age children was termed a "vital need on the home front" by the Most Rev. Maurice F. McAuliffe, Bishop of Hartford, in a letter addressed to the clergy of his Diocese, which was published in The Catholic Transcript, diocesan newspaper.

The letter stated "no responsibility is more pressing than finding the foster homes and pointed out that the diocesan child care institutions "are taxed to capacity." Requirements of foster parents are simple, he pointed out, and said "there can be no more meritorious work than that Catholic families in these days share their homes with these children."

Humane Penal System Needs More Religion To Succeed

LOS ANGELES (NC)—Religion must be given the place it deserves in the penal and correctional field to forestall the efforts of proponents of extreme corporal punishment to reduce humanism in the prison system, the Most Rev. Robert J. Armstrong, Bishop of Sacramento, asserted in an address at the annual meeting of Catholic chaplains in California's penal and correctional institutions, held in Hollywood.

Bishop Armstrong said there is a country-wide movement calling for the re-examination of methods of dealing with juvenile and adult delinquency.

"Many of those who want to re-examine our existing systems feel that what we need is a revival of real convictions regarding human beings," the Bishop said. "They are convinced that all our social welfare, all our work for delinquents must become more personal. They do not want to disregard science; they want to make use of it but they feel that in the last analysis any system of penology must be based on genuine convictions on the part of man in regard to the nature of his fellow man. This attitude must be expressed in the work of those who deal with delinquents; above all it must be expressed in a fuller recognition of the place of religion

in the penal and correctional field. We have not given religion the place it deserves in this field. All must now struggle to return religion to its rightful place."

The chaplains discussed ways and means of making religion an integral part of programs in institutions dealing with delinquency. They also discussed development of religious counselling service in connection with probation and parole.

10,000 Seminarists Join Pope in Prayers

VATICAN CITY.—Responding to the invitation of His Holiness Pope Pius XII to join him in a month of prayer during May, 10,000 major and minor seminarists in China are offering special prayers and sacrifices for the Holy Father's intention. His Excellency the Most Rev. Mario Zanin, Apostolic Delegate to China, advises in a cable that has been received here.
