**Farmers Union Reporting Exact Date Of Crucifixion Denied By Catholic Group**

The following account of a Farmers Union meeting held in Church Point, Louisiana, gives the Catholic Rural Life Conference great joy. The development in that parish is due to the energy of Fathers Blomven and Labbe, both enthusiastic members of the N.C.R.L.C. and participants in Rural Life Schools.

"The meeting was opened by the president, Mr. Martin Cormier, who then called upon Mr. E. C. Meaux, local Agricultural teacher to explain to the group present the progress that had been made in the plans for the canning, dehydration and hatchery plant. His discourse brought about a great number of questions during the discussion part. All of these matters greatly interested the many men and women members who were present. Further discussions will be held at the next meeting, at which Mr. Alexis Larriviere of the Vocational Education department will be present, on the construction of the building necessary to house the equipment.

WASHINGTON. (NC) —A report recently circulated by a secular news agency to the effect that the Catholic Biblical Association has determined April 7, in the year 30 A. D., was the exact date of the Crucifixion and Death of Our Lord has been denied here by the Rev. Dr. Joseph L. Lilly, C.M., secretary of the association.

The erroneous report has been published in a number of newspapers, it was stated. Father Lilly announced the association has not arrived at any such determination and did not give out any such report.

He added he did not know the source of the erroneous information.

He further said: "It is impossible in the light of present evidence to determine with absolute finality the exact year of the Crucifixion. But that is really a matter of secondary importance; what really counts is that Jesus Christ lived on earth and claimed to be God—a claim which He satisfactorily substantiated—and that He died for the redemption of all mankind. The exact day and year of His death is of relatively little importance."
