## DECINES WOMEN WORKING

AUBURN — "The War and the Family" was the subject of an instructive talk by Rev. Arthur E. Rattigan, Ph.D., assistant director of the Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Rochester, at the May Meeting of the Catholic Action League of St. Alphonsus Church. Dr. Rattigan who is a graduate of the Catholic University of America, was introduced by Rev. Frederick G. Straub, moderator of the League.

He stated that the birth control movement was the fundamental cause of marital difficulties. Dr. Rattigan continued saying: "Women with children under the age of 14 should be the last to be called upon to leave their homes and enter the factory or other employment outside of the home. We find women today going back and forth to work in the shops and in the offices and beds with men not their husbands, unkindful of the family life and the children at home."

The husband and wife get along during the depression, the husband going to his work, while the wife stayed home and looked after the house and children. Hence family life thrived. But times have changed, he said. These days with big wages prevailing, the women rush hither and thither to work outside the home, and in the quest for high living and amusement, the birth control movement has found fertile ground. Dr. Rattigan spoke of delinquency as it applied to girls and declared that the only solution to the whole problem is to get back to God.

Miss Athleen Reid, president, presided at the meeting which was

attended by more than 70 members and guests. Following the short business meeting, a special hour with refreshments was enjoyed. Assembly singing was enjoyed with Mrs. Joseph J. Maloney as accompanist. A piano duet was played by the Misses Mary Alice and Eileen Maloney, daughters of Mrs. Joseph Maloney. Vocal solos were rendered by Miss Patricia Maglieri, Ray Gerard Amann and Rev. Gerard Coffey, St. Alphonsus' assistants, were guests at the meeting.
