Due to the present war conditions, the four jubilees will be marked principally by spiritual devotions of thanksgiving.

Father Hynes will celebrate a Jubilee High Mass on Sunday, June 6 at 10 A. M. in St. Patrick's Church, Owego. That evening at 8 P. M. the school children will stage a Patriotic Pageant in the Church Hall to be followed by an informal reception for parishioners and friends. The public is invited to the pageant.

The Jubilee Solemn High Mass for the parish will be celebrated by Father Scheid in St. Mary's Church, Danville, on Sunday, June 13 at 10 A. M. Assisting Father Scheid will be: Deacon, the Rev. Adelbert Schneider, Pastor, St. Joseph's Church, Wayland; and Subdeacon, the Rev. Orrin W. Falter, Assistant Pastor, St. Mary's Church, Danville. Preacher will be the Rev. William W. Heisel, Pastor, Holy Family Church, Rochester.

A Mass for the children of St. Mary's School will be offered by Father Scheid on Tuesday, June 8 at 8 A. M.

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Caution Urged On Comintern's Dissolution

WASHINGTON (AP)—Only time and the conduct of the Communists themselves will tell whether there is any real significance to the dissolution of the Communist Third International (Comintern) announced from Moscow in the bulletin of Thursday here.

Since it was the avowed purpose of the Comintern to promote the Communist revolution in countries outside of Russia, it is pointed out, the real test of its dissolution will be whether the action has any effect on the activities of Communists in the United States, France, England, Mexico and elsewhere. There already has been enthusiastic comment in this country on the report of the dissolution of the Comintern. However, the best qualified commentator—Earl Browder, General Secretary of the Communist Party of the United States—has said it will have no effect at all.

On the very day that American newspapers carried the announcement of the Comintern's reported dissolution, they carried this statement by Browder:

"The proposal of dissolution of the Communist International, made by the presiding committee of that organization, does not affect organizationally the status of the Communist Party of the United States because since 1940 the Communist Party of the United States of America has maintained no affiliation outside the borders of the United States."

Browder was also quoted as saying he could not at once give a decision as to the continued signing of "The Internationale." This was a little perplexing to students of the public scene. They were ready to believe that the dissolution of the Comintern would make no difference in the status of the Communist Party in the United States. But if this were so, why should there be any hesitancy over the future of "The Internationale" as the party's anthem. On the other hand, if "The Internationale" has remained as the party's anthem till now, was the cleavage with the "Comintern" in 1940 as definite as Browder and his associates would have the American people believe?

25 Year Priestly Careers Of Pastors Pass In Review

With distinguished careers in their sacerdotal vocation, the four priests who are this year celebrating completion of 25 years in the Holy Priesthood have zealously performed their various duties on the way to becoming pastors.

Members of the class of 1918 of St. Bernard's Seminary, the four priests were ordained with their classmates in St. Patrick's Cathedral on June 8, 1918.

Highlights of their Silver Years in the Holy Priesthood are:

The Rev. Michael L. Hynes, born in St. Joseph's parish, East Rush, was educated in Scottsville High School, St. Andrew's Seminary and St. Bernard's Seminary. He served as Administrator of St. Mary's Church, Geneseo, from August, 1918, until November, 1919. He was Assistant Pastor at St. Boniface Church and Chaplain of the State and County Buildings for 2 years. On Nov. 11, 1921, Father Hynes was appointed Procurator of St. Bernard's Seminary. Eleven years later, in June, 1932, he became Pastor of St. Patrick's, Owego, his present charge.

Father Hynes' mother, Mrs. Johanna Hynes, 23 Chandler St., Rochester, mother of 8 children, is 83 years of age and in comparatively good health.

The Rev. Edward M. Scheid, born in Rochester, received his education at St. Michael's School, Rochester; St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminary. After his first Solemn Mass at St. Michael's Church, Rochester, June 9, 1918, he served as Assistant Pastor in Holy Family Church, Rochester,

until 1927. From 1927 to 1931 he was assistant at SS. Peter and Paul's Church, Rochester. First appointment as Pastor was of St. Junarius Church, Naples, and St. Matthias' Church, Atlanta, where he served from 1931 to 1936 until named to the present pastorate, St. Mary's, Danville.

Cemetery Field Mass Marks Memorial Day In Elmira

The 24th annual Memorial Day Field Mass was celebrated in SS. Peter and Paul's Cemetery on Monday at 11 A. M., about an hour after the end of the parade. The Rev. Albert Bismontelli celebrated the Solemn

High Mass, which followed recitation of the Rosary by Rt. Rev. Magr. John J. Lee, V.F. An altar was erected in the Priests' Circle before the Crucifixion group, with pastors accompanying their congregations. Rev. Leslie Whelan was master of ceremonies.

Mrs. C. H. Kennedy, organist at SS. Peter and Paul's, directed the choir, assisted by Mrs. H. R. Amacher.

In explanation of the purpose of the ceremonies, Magr. Lee said in part:

"To recall the virtues of the dead, the lives that they have lived, the good they have done, and the examples that they have given. We learn from their lives how we ourselves should live so that when our time comes we will have after us a kind remembrance and a good example for those who are still living. But while these

thoughts are useful for the living, they still the dead nothing. So the real purpose of the service is to go beyond the grave, and follow the soul into eternity."

Magr. Lee continued by referring to the second Book of Maccabees, verse 43:

"And making a gathering he sent 12,000 drachmas of silver to Jerusalem for sacrifice to be offered for the sins of the dead, thinking well and religiously concerning the resurrection." Also in Verse 48: "It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they might be freed from their sins."

Magr. Lee concluded: "Our chief object, therefore, is by prayer and sacrifice to bring eternal peace and rest to the dead. Let us do this not in the hope of the good things that they did here in life."
