Lauriston Welch, general chairman of the ceremonies, spoke from a platform erected on East Market Street, near the Crystal City Gas Building, where the American Legion-Kiwanis Club Community Service Roll was unveiled and dedicated.

Opening the services the entire assemblage sang "America," led by Walter Smith, tenor, and accompanied by the Painted Post

High School Band. The Rev. Roger Alling, rector of Christ Episcopal Church, gave the invocation.

Mrs. George D. Macbeth, chairman of Corning Chapter of the American Red Cross, spoke briefly on the importance of Red Cross voluntary service. She was followed by Clement L. Murphy, commander of the John P. Eaton Post, and Arthur J. Aggett, Jr., president of the Kiwanis Club, both of whom spoke briefly in connection with the Service Roll.

Mayer Daniel Stinson accepted the Roll for the City, thanking the John P. Eaton Post and the Kiwanis Club for their patriotic gift.

Benediction was given by the Rev. John C. Newcomb, assistant pastor at St. Mary's Church, after which Mr. Smith led the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner," this time accompanied by the Corning Free Academy Band.

The parade, under the direction of Lynn W. Cooper and A. J. Stivers, marched to the scene of the dedication, later proceeding to the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument, where a wreath was placed by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary.

Following services at Hope Cemetery a delegation of Legionnaires, with a firing squad and a bugler from the local State Guard Company went to St. Mary's Cemetery for brief services at the grave of the Rev. William Cassidy, a World War chaplain.

**DUTCH UNIVERSITIES CLOSE IN PROTEST AGAINST NAZIS**

**NEW YORK.**—(NC)—The Catholic University of Nijmegen and the Catholic Trade University at Tilbury, both in the Netherlands, have closed down rather than continue operations on the restrictive measures imposed on schools and students by the German authorities, the Netherlands Information Bureau here reported it had learned from London.

A number of other universities in the country, it was reported, also have suspended classes. The reports stated that under orders of the Nazi authorities, students were made to sign "declarations of obedience" and the number of students who refused to sign were in such preponderance, this situation alone made the holding of classes futile.

**Academy Class Hears Priest Cite Need For Religious Training**

"Teach your children the three R's—reading, riling, and ritame-lic, and leave out the fourth great R—religion—and you'll raise a nation of devils," said The Rev. Leo G. Schwab, quoting from the words of the Duke of Wellington, in an address to the Junior Class Day Assembly, at the Academy on Friday, May 29, at 1 p. m.

Stressing the necessity of religion, as expressed by Washington and Roosevelt, Father Schwab vigorously attacked the modern rejection of the old moral codes, riling the evils of juvenile delinquency, and especially the doctrine of sex indulgence as accepted by modern youth.

Father Schwab declared that God does not ask men to accept His code, any more than prisoners are requested to obey. The supposition that He does is like the story of the man who, when presented with his income tax questionnaire, said "I don't think I'll join." "Pay here or you'll pay hereafter," said Father Schwab. He stated that we cannot expect religion to remedy the delinquency situation until it is taught in the schools.

**Name Nurse To Carry On Tuberculosis Work**

**CORNING.**—Miss Mary Krebs, daughter of Leo J. Krebs, 17 W. Fifth Street, and the late Mrs. Krebs has been appointed as nurse in charge of tuberculosis work and assumed her new duties at the City Clinic on Wednesday, May 26. This project is being sponsored by the Social Service Society of Corning for one year, under a proposition adopted by the Corning Board of Health.

Miss Krebs, a graduate of St. Mary's School, Corning Free Academy and St. Joseph's Hospital Training School for Nurses at Elmira, had pursued her profession in Corning as both a general and private duty nurse at Corning Hospital. Her appointment was made by the Social Service Society with the approval of the Board of Health and the City Health Officer. She will work under the supervision of the City Health Officer, with detailed supervision and training in the field of public health being furnished by the city nurses.

**ENVOY LAUDS POPE'S BENEVOLENCE TO FINLAND**

**VATICAN CITY.**—(NC)—At a press conference in Stockholm, the Finnish Minister to Sweden, formerly his country's envoy at the Holy See, Dr. Gripenberg, stated that Finland is deeply grateful to His Holiness Pope Pius XII for his benevolent interest in that country. This information was contained in a dispatch carried by the KIPA news agency.

Dr. Gripenberg, it was stated, cited as an example the gift by the Holy Father of \$10,000 for needy Finnish children. He stated that his stay at the Holy See had convinced him that salutary initiatives emanating from the Vatican for the welfare of mankind might be expected.

**YOUTH IN PLEDGE**

**New York.**—A pledge against "racial, religious and economic intolerance" and against Axis "acts of oppression and barbarism" was adopted at mass meeting of Australian youth organizations in Melbourne, the Australian radio announced in a broadcast beamed at North Africa, which was recorded by U. S. monitors.
