Reporting Exact Date Of Crucifixion Denied By Catholic Group

WASHINGTON—(NC)—A report recently circulated by a secular news agency to the effect that the Catholic Biblical Association has determined April 7, in the year 36 A. D., was the exact date of the Crucifixion and Death of Our Lord has been denied here by the Rev. Dr. Joseph L. Laffy, C.M., secretary of the association.

The erroneous report had been published in a number of newspapers. It was stated, Father Laffy announced the association has not arrived at any such determination and did not give out such report.

He added he did not know the source of the erroneous information.

He further said: "It is impossible in the light of present evidence to determine with absolute finality the exact year of the Crucifixion. But that is really a matter of secondary importance; what really counts is that Jesus Christ lived on earth and claimed to be God—a claim which He satisfactorily substantiated—and that He died for the redemption of all mankind. The exact day and year of His death is of relatively little importance."

Bishop Donahue Notes 25th Anniversary Of Ordination

NEW YORK—At his own request, there were no formal ceremonies on May 25 marking the twenty-fifth anniversary of the ordination of the Most Rev. Stephen J. Donahue, Auxiliary Bishop of New York.

Bishop Donahue was ordained in Rome on May 23, 1918. On May 25 he celebrated Mass for the school children of his parish, Holy Name Church, and in a brief address said that nothing seemed to him more fitting or could please him more than to have the prayers of the children at this time.
